# Christine Jorgensen, transsexual pioneer, dead at age 62

Thirty four years after she shocked the world by changing her gender, Christine Jorgensen died of cancer May 3. She was 62.

With a blend of amazement and titillation, the news media turned her into a celebrity upon her return from Denmark where the surgery was performed in a government hospital in Copenhagen. She had hoped to keep her sex change private, but a family friend revealed her secret to reporters, setting off a media circus. Not only was she the subject of newspaper and magazine stories, she even became the butt of comedians' jokes.

"I have no regrets over the publicity," she said in the late '70s, "but at first I hated it."

She was born George Jorgensen to parents of Danish descent in the Bronx, N.Y. Jorgensen was drafted into the Army and served a traumatic hitch. Afterwards, he worked as a photographer. At one point he learned that sex change operations were being performed in Denmark, but were not widely publicized. After saving for two years, he sailed to Denmark for a year of hormone treatments and eventually the three operations that made her a woman.

She took hormones for the rest of her life, and when she reached her 50's she began to worry that they could cause cancer. But the cancer that took her life was not related to the sex change operation or to the continuing hormone therapy. Her mother also died from the same sort of bladder cancer.

Regarding her instant notoriety, Jorgensen once observed, "I guess it was at the beginning of the sexual revolution and I just happened to be one of the trigger mechanisms. I'm very proud that I was there when the movement started. I may not have started it myself, but I gave it a good swift kick in the pants."

Thanks in great part to her willingness to be open about her sex change, she lived to see what was considered a bizarre surgical procedure become much more common, so common, in fact, that today some people cannot imagine the problems she faced. For instance, she was barred from appearing on television. "I think they thought I was going to take off my clothes and run screaming through the studio." In 1953, police in Las Vegas said they would arrest her on charges of masquerading if she appeared on the Saraha Hotel stage in women's clothes. Although Jorgensen was twice engaged, she never married. One reason was the discrimination she faced as a transsexual (a term she never used); New York State refused to issue her a marriage license. The other reason, she said, was quite normal.

"I was deeply in love twice. But I was never in love with anybody I was engaged to. And I was never engaged to anybody I loved. Isn't that a perfectly normal syndrome?"

While she capitalized on her fame to some degree—including 10 years with a touring night club act, stage roles, television talk shows and college lectures—she refused movie contracts and, when she was younger, any offer that she consid-

#### Renaissance guilty, if caring is a crime... Alison Laing, Managing Director

The outstanding growth of membership and the success of Renaissance since its founding a little over two years ago is testimony to providing the right services, in the right location, at the right time. From the beginning, the founders envisioned an open group addressing the concerns and needs of all transgendered persons, their families and the community. Our education and outreach programs have been directed at the general public, helping professionals, friends, family and all members of our community. Our education and support goals are being met through the public media, our own publications and chapter meetings.

In our zeal and enthusiasm to

help other "sisters" in different geographic locations, we may appear to be implementing a policy of "aggressive expansionism." We publicize the prospects of new groups and chapters being organized throughout the U.S. (though mostly in the mid-Atlantic region). We do this in an upbeat way, encouraging others to join with the hope of getting a new group off to a good start.

There is no magic in the name "Renaissance", nor are there any "secrets" of success. With or without Renaissance backing, starting a new group, or revitalizing an old one, takes enthusiastic dedication, commitment and just plain hard work. The policy of Renaissance is to help any like-minded, "open"

group of transgendered people to mold themselves into an organization that serves their local needs. If using "Renaissance" as a banner helps, then fine. We welcome groups that desire to take advantage of our national newsletter distribution, and other support services, by becoming chapters. If a group desires to remain independent, that's okay with us too. We offer advice, guidance and publicity — no strings attached — to any "open" group.

Aggressive expansionism? Yes, if that's what you call the goal of helping others to develop their organizations to serve their local needs. We, of Renaissance, can think of no greater indictment, and we plead: GUILTY as charged!

#### The secrets of our success...JoAnn Roberts

Many people have mused, both publicly and privately, on the success of Renaissance. They want to know what our "secrets" are. We're only too glad to share them.

The first secret is hard work. Every person involved in the management of Renaissance, from the local level to national leadership, has made a personal commitment of time and energy to the group.

The second secret is good team building. This is a management skill learned through work experience. A good management team needs special talents that create synergy: the sum being greater than its parts. Those talents are:

- Facilitation The ability to get things done by working with others.
- Practicality The ability and the confidence to speak out when others seem to be planting their feet firmly in midair.
- Prudent frugality The ability to control the purse strings and keep the dreamers from running wild with others' money.

- Creativity The ability to develop new and innovative ideas.
- Strategy The ability to project from the present to the future, and provide a backup plan.

Once the team has a few people with these qualities, the rest of the positions should be filled with team players. They help gain support for ideas and make sure that those ideas are carried out.

The third secret is to delegate responsibility. But couple responsibility with authority. It is foolish to expect people to accomplish anything without command of the resources needed. This concept is known as "empowering."

The fourth and final secret is avoid some typical management "sins." Specifically:

- Avoid autocratic decisions Get everyone on the team involved to build a consensus. Make decisions based on all the information available.
- Eschew fuzzy goals Develop precise objectives, or tell people exactly what is expected from them. And give them the authority to do it.

Don't meddle unless there is a serious problem.

- Eliminate inconsistent behavior Most people can deal with any style of management if they know what to expect. Keeping them off balance with erratic behavior breeds disappointment, frustration and anger.
- Wipe out abuse of privilege —
   Managers have a right to some perks, but overdoing it sends the message, "I'm better than you are."
   This leads to unproductive dissent.
- Break rigid traditions Traditions have their place in every society, but not all traditions are necessarily good ones. Inability to change leads to stagnation.
- Avoid favoritism Favoritism is, in a word, discrimination. It destroys morale. When only a select few have their opinions heard, confidence in leadership drops. New people may have better ideas. Give them air time and listen.

So, there they are. Not surprisingly, there are no "secrets," just good sense and good management techniques.

# Epilady, Trick or Treat?...Debbie

I want to pass along a few personal observations and a moneysaving idea.

First, how many of you have rushed out to buy your very own Epilady hair removal system? How many have been brave enough to use it - more than once? The ads say it may produce a "slight tingling sensation" the first time you use it. Is there anybody out there who has used it who would agree with that claim? It's very obvious to the most casual user that the device literally pulls the hair out by the roots. Funny, I've never felt any "slight tingling" upon having my hair pulled out by it's roots-no matter where it may be located on my body. The bottom line here is this "wonderful gift" for the sophisticated woman is also one of the most hideous devices of torture ever perpetrated upon the fairer sex in modern times.

I will admit, through regular use

of the device, one can obtain hairless, stubble-free skin that is exquisitely sensual. And, as most know well, hair that is removed this way may not return for several weeks. I have discovered that if you can survive the trauma during the initial use of this device, you are likely to feel less and less discomfort with repeated use. This is because new hair growth doesn't seem to be as painful to remove.

Since hair does not grow at a uniform rate, repeated use of the device pulls fewer and few hairs in any given treatment. You don't have have less hair to pull, but fewer hairs will be pulled at any one time. Logically then, the less hairs pulled, the less discomfort.

So, if you are brave enough to participate in this trendy approach to hair removal, I would like to offer some words of advice from my own experiences.

The first place I used the Epilady was on my lower calves, around the ankles. The pain was so unbearable that it took my breath away. I quickly decided that shaving wasn't really all that inconvenient. I also concluded that anybody who would continue the use of this high-tech nightmare must surely be a serious masochist, which upon further consideration might not be such a bad form of pain distraction.

Curiosity finally got the better of me and several weeks later I began a calculated program of regular use. I have detailed here some of the "tricks" that I serendipitously discovered.

Use an electric hair trimmer first: Sears has several models. Trim the hair in the area that you wish to remove to about a quarter inch in length. Longer hairs tend to get caught in the coils and pulled from all the wrong angles resulting in

Television recently has had many TV surprises. In April, the NBC program Unsolved Mysteries featured a story about con man Jerry Dean Michael who in 1975 posed as Geraldine Carmichael, the inventor of a nonexistent three-wheeled car that he claimed got 70 miles to a gallon of gas and was practically indestructible. After duping investors into giving "her" \$6 million, Michael was arrested and convicted of fraud. But he skipped out on authorities in 1980 and hadn't been heard of since.

After the show aired, authorities received a tip that Michael, now 61, was living in a rural community east of Austin, Tex., and operating a flower shop. At the time of his arrest, Michael was posing as Katherine Elizabeth Johnson.

Johnson (nee Carmichael; nee Michael) isn't the only long-time crossdresser who made it into the news recently. In San Francisco, the Sisters of Perpetual Indulgence celebrated their 10th anniversary of combining street theater, gender f—k drag, and political activism.

The sisters made their first big public appearance at an anti-nuclear parade. Their attendance was at first discouraged by the organizers of the demonstration because the sisters were drag queens and not germane to the issue of nuclear war. "We knew that they were simply having a lapse of conscience," said Sister Missionary Position, "and that they would love us if we showed up." That was something of an understatement, for the crowd went wild at the sight of the nuns carrying pom-poms, leading antinuclear cheers and saying a rosary for the time of nuclear peril.

In time, the sisters took up many social issues, and treated them with a unique style of camp humor that assaulted official pomposity. At the height of their popularity, Sister Boom Boom campaigned for San Francisco city supervisor and garnered over 20,000 votes in the 1982 election. In that same year the sisters were responsible for producing the first safe sex literature.

Eventually, divisions developed in the order resulting in a court case that established The Sisters of Perpetual Indulgence, Inc. A breakaway group organized as the Unincorporated Sisters of Perpetual Indulgence.

Chapters of the main body have been established in Seattle, Toronto and Sydney, Australia.

The idea of men dressing up as nuns has not been well-accepted by many people. But there is no denying that the Sisters have had a profound effect. "Gender identification and roles is the most emotionally charged issue in our culture," said Sister Power Hungry Bitch, one of the order's founders. "Mixing that with the religious references was an incredibly powerful vision."

While the sisters came from the gay community, that community still hasn't totally embraced what the order stands for. For example, the Houston gay pride committee guidelines for last month's (June) parade forbade "offensive drag" which was defined as men in dresses with facial and body hair. Some people, but evidently not those on the committee, found the guidelines ironic seeing as how they were an

attempt to regulate an event that commemorates the Stonewall Riots of June, 1969. The riots began when a group of New York City drag queens resisted what had been common police harassment. That event is considered to be the beginning of the gay rights movement.

Another sort of offensive drag became the target of angry citizens in Washington, D.C., recently. Residents of the Northwest neighborhood around 10th and M streets grew tired of playing host to crossdressed prostitutes and so they erected a banner over the intersection that read "The 'girls' have gone to 5th and K."

For ten years the intersection had been famous for prostitution. But then the area experienced a real estate boom (houses are selling for upward of \$250,000), and the sight of men in bikinis and short skirts doesn't fit the yuppie image. The neighbors responsible for the sign said they had nothing against the 'girls,' they just hoped the banner would confuse their customers.

What did the business owners at 5th and K, primarily a commercial area, have to say about the plan? "We resent someone trying to shove prostitution into our neighborhood," said the owner of one bar. But it looks as if his worries are over. Within a few weeks of its erection, the banner was removed by city workers because it was in violation of a city ordinance.

Police in Turkey have a more direct way of dealing with transvestites, but according to one report, their tactics may be actually increasing prostitution by men dressed as women.

A transvestite from Turkey writes that when they are arrested for wearing women's clothes in public, transvestites are often imprisoned in cells where they have to sleep on

Group meetings offer a safe, social situation where you can learn to relax and work on your public presentation skills. Once you learn to be at ease with your peers in the group, you may be ready to explore other venues. Your comfort level with your feminine image will increase over time as you practice.

But even the most accomplished crossdressers have moments of insecurity. Recently, I arrived about fifteen minutes early for a Renaissance college lecture engagement. Like nuns, we usually travel in pairs, but this time I was going solo. As I waited in the hallway, many students and faculty passed me by with nary a notice of my presence. Then, "IT" happened.

A young woman came through the doors at the opposite end of the hall. She looked at me, crossed the hall, and spoke with two other women sitting there. She looked at me again before disappearing into a classroom. I knew my secret was out, but I was there to talk about crossdressing anyway.

The professor arrived and led the way to the classroom for the lecture; the same classroom which held my "discoverer." There she was, in the front row.

After class she approached me while I was speaking with some of the other students. I smiled at her and thought, "Great! This is where she says, I knew you were a guy." Her actual remarks took me quite by surprise. After commenting on the informative lecture, she said, "When I first saw you in the hallway, I didn't know you were a male. Ilooked twice because I thought you were an interesting looking person."

As it turned out, the professor had not told the class about my lecture for that day. This woman, like the rest of the students and faculty, had no reason to suspect that I was anything other than what I appeared to be: an interesting looking woman. My own insecurities led me to believe I had been "read." I had assumed, since I knew my true sex and gender, it also must have been obvious to anyone who looked at me twice. I let my own awareness of my crossdressing work against me.

Take a lesson from my experience. If you assume your "secret" is out, it will become much more difficult to maintain your feminine poise. Don't create your own sense of failure. Someone may "read" you. That person may, or may not, let you know they have done so. To some degree, their reaction depends on your reaction. You put a lot of effort into your image and your poise. Believe in yourself and then assume the world believes the image you present to it.

With regard to the bathroom debate going on in The Renaissance News, some of the opinions expressed made me give thought to the issue. I found one letter, in particular, very interesting. It was so instructional as to cover almost everything one might want to know about the use of bathrooms. Among other points, this letter suggested that one might inquire of a police officer as to which bathroom would be appropriate and also recommended sitting down to urinate. The author revealed significant insight into these issues.

There are, I believe, just a few minor clarifications required to put a wrap on this important subject. Therefore, I offer the following comments.

- Noise abatement The vocal utterances one makes in a bathroom are often giveaways. When speaking in a ladies' room, try to avoid using phrases like, "How about them Flyers?", or "Where are the urinals?" Coughing can also be hazardous. Consider carrying a kazoo. Coughing through a kazoo may ease the sound to an acceptable level.
- Personal hygiene—Certain actions, while acceptable in one location, may not be acceptable in another. For instance, shave before you leave home. Shaving in the ladies's room only calls undue attention to yourself.
- Position It is correct that you should sit to urinate, but please make sure your feet are pointed in

the proper direction, toward the stall door. If they face the rear of the stall, you are surely sitting in an erroneous manner. And I cannot emphasize too strongly the need to remove undergarments before sitting.

 Authoritarian advice — Finally, when approaching a police officer for counsel on which facility is appropriate for use, it may be preferable to seek one who is not carrying a firearm.

Your newsletter is one of high quality (this communication not-withstanding). It is therefore my hope that you will continue to address subjects of great importance and that this silliness over bathrooms can be ended.

a bare stone floor and buy their own food at higher prices charged other inmates. He said they are also held for much longer than the normal period.

When they are released from jail, transvestites are ordered to a hospital for treatment of "sexual illnesses." Other forms of official harassment include "being prevented from entering into our own houses by police."

The writer concluded by saying, "We are not given any jobs and the only thing we can do is prostitution."

But help may be on the way from the new gay movement in Turkey. Following a hunger strike by gay rights activists, the powerful Turkish media has begun to report on issues regarding sexual minorities.

Turkey isn't the only place where transgendered people have employment problems. The U.S. Navy has court-martialed a sailor in Washington State for "conduct to the prejudice of good order and discipline and of a nature to bring dis-

credit upon the Armed Forces."

help from Navy psychiatrists, but was denied counseling. He then turned to a transgendered support group near the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard where he was stationed. He began attending the meetings crossdressed and took the name of Karen Davis. But the poop hit the deck when he was spotted several times in women's clothes in the vicinity of the shipyard.

Ms. Davis was following a long line of transgendered people who have chosen to serve their country in uniform. One member of the elite corps died recently.

Kenneth Ulane had flown combat missions over Vietnam between 1964 and 1968. He later became a pilot with Eastern Airlines. Then, after 12 years with the airline, Kenneth became Karen in 1980. She was fired for not fitting the "Wings of Man" image. Ulane sued Eastern, charging that the firing was illegal under federal law that banned discrimination on the basis of sex. While a federal district judge agreed with her and ordered reinstatement and \$156,590 in back pay, the ruling was overturned after an appeal

by Eastern. Later, Ulane and the airline reached a private settlement that her attorney said was "substantially more" than what the district court had given her.

Although Eastern would not employ her, a small air taxi and cargo company in the Midwest did. Recently, one of the company's DC-3s crashed in a field near DeKalb, Ill. The three people aboard were killed, including pilot Karen Ulane. She was 48.

While our community is saddened by the loss of two brave pioneers—Karen Ulane and Christine Jorgensen—life goes on.

They also say life is a cabaret, and that was certainly true in St. Louis recently when 1,000 cheering spectators saw Netasha Edwards crowned Miss Gay U.S.A. 1989. The Indiana girl competed against 67 other contestants from 36 states to win the crown. Hoosiers, in fact, swept the pageant; first runner-up Candi Stratton and second runner-up Eddie Dee also hail from Indiana.

increased pain and broken hairshafts that are not successfully removed. The trimmed hairs result in a more concentrated local work area, and also increase probability that the removal will be from the correct angle, which is supposed to be less painful.

Start with a less tender area of skin. Everyone's body will be a little different but I started with my hands and fingers. I've kept the hair on my hands shaved and trimmed for several years, so I really wasn't concerned about the implications of total removal. As it turned out, nobody noticed.

The first treatment on my hands took every bit of endurance that I've ever had. Frankly, it was almost unbearable. But now I routinely do my hands (about every two to three weeks) and experience only minor discomfort.

After the experience with my hands, I repeated the same approach on my arms, then my legs, and then my stomach. Each time I achieved similar results. My arms and legs are now always smooth and soft. There is only slight discomfort maintaining them.

Hopefully the pain will decrease through successive uses. My stomach is much more sensitive than my hands or legs and I still experience a lot of agony there. I use the Epilady down to the top of my pubic area which is not a very pleasant experience at all. However, once I began to luxuriate in the sensation of smooth, hairless, stubble-free skin, I developed a passionate motivation that makes it easier to endure the suffering.

I am now struggling with the final frontier — my chest. If you have ever shaved your chest you know just how unfeminine the inevitable stubble is. Regrettably, my chest is the most sensitive area yet. Thankfully it's the last. I prefer to continue shaving my underarms.

The pain of using Epilady on my

chest is so intense that I've almost passed out. I've resorted to tweezing chest hairs for now in hopes that later the hair will sufficiently weakened to allow regular Epilady treatments. Tweezing is definitely painful, but I can stand it better and vary the locations of hairs pulled.

For those who are familiar with the S&M concept of pleasure and pain, you may find this whole process very stimulating, combining reality with fantasy. While using your Epilady, simply dwell on your favorite fantasy and you may discover that you can endure more pain than otherwise possible.

Another thought is be prepared for infections. You may experience some swelling and occasional redness in the form of small spots where the hairs were either removed or broken. If this is the case, use a cotton ball to apply rubbing alcohol. Massage the alcohol into and around the infected area. [Editor's note: alcohol has a drying effect on the skin and may aggravate the infection. We suggest a topical anesthetic/ antibiotic like Bactine®.] Keep the area clean with regular bathing. In about a week your skin should clear and be very beautiful and silky smooth.
