The Gender Identity Research Treat-ment Program at UCLA is currently treating 50 male youngsters between the ages $4\frac{1}{2}$ and 10, all of whom walk with a mince, talk with a lisp and want to be girls. Psychiatrist Richard Green, founder of the program, hopes to discover why the boys are effeminate, help them deal with the hos-tility they generate among others and perhaps enable them to someday engage in heterosexual relationships.

Reported by Image Magazine. Man Ordered to Assume Full Female ID in Georgia.

Dressing as a woman pereodically, led C. Willams arrest. Agreeing to do it all the time set him free from charges of impersonating a woman. City Attorney M.Shapiro agreed to drop the case against Williams, a 34 year old bartender, if he would assume a feminine first name, change his driver license to read "female" and (cont. page 4)

wear only woman's clothes.

Williams had been arrested 7 times by the police for violating an ordenance that prohibits the public concealment of identity of sex, passed after several stores had been robbed by men in women's clothing.

Williams would have been sentenced to 420 days in jail and fined \$1400 if he had been convicted.

Judge **WITTE** G. Fotte agreed to dismiss the charges, but warned that "This" was an individual and unique case, and would not be used as a precident in enforcing the new law. ********

It's legal to dress in drag

For the first time in recent memory, it is legal today

for a man to dress as a woman - and vice versa - on San Francisco's streets.

The city ordinance banning persons in drag was among a number of code sections dealing with sex-related laws that were tossed out yesterday by the Board of Supervi-SOLS.

Legislation presented by Supervisor Peter Tamaras eliminated these items from the code:

• Prohibitions wearing of apparel of the opposite sex with intent to deceive.

 Prohibitions against advertising abortions, lewd literature and cures for veneral diseases.

• Prohibitions against minors congregating on public streets after midnight.

• Laws prohibiting persons from carrying advertising signs on public streets.

• A law forbidding persons from appearing on public streets in unusual costume or to "make unusual noises for advertising purposes."

Tamaras said some of the laws were clearly unconstitutional and noted that police were not enforcing them any-7-16-74 FRISCO PAPER way.

Fuzzy Lip Gave Her (Him) Away

CLARKSVILLE, Tenn. -(UPI) - A trace of fuzz on the upper lip tipped police the attractive young brunette was no lady, but an Army deserter.

The cute brunette, wearing a green miniskirt, red velve blouse, black silk hose and

black leather boots, was picked up by Patrolman Robert Riggins in sub-freezing weather outside a bus station.

The "lady" told officers at police headquarters through a series of notes she was deaf and dumb, and needed a ride to Nashville.

But Detective Bill South arrived in time to foil the plot.

South noticed the "woman's" upper lip was covered with fuzz, and he later estab-lished "she" was Pvt. Joseph D. Diorio, about 24, of

New York City. He was reported AWOL last July and later listed as a deserter.

After spending a night in jail, Diorio was fined \$158.50 yesterday on charges of loi-tering, disorderly conduct and carrying a deadly weap-on, a straight razor found in his purse.
