Session 2a,2b,2c Thu 10-11 AM, 11-12 AM and 2-3 PM <u>How to Form an</u> <u>Organization</u>. Moderator Gloria Peters, panel members _____,

, ______, and ______. The logical lead-off for the conference, Session 2a, subtitled <u>Creating and Maintaining</u>, addresses the birth pains and survival issues that each of our community's organizations have confronted and that future groups must face. A long-term objective is the creation of a permanent reference on how to form and maintain an organization. Panel members will review the experience of their organizations, and respond

to questions from the audience. 10-11 AM.

Session 2b, subtitled <u>Outreach</u>, seeks to put together a list of all possible ways to reach potential new members. Outreach is naturally the major humanitarian goal of our organizations, but it is also a survival issue, as an organization must grow to above-critical size to achieve the resources it needs to survive. The panel will review what has worked and what has not worked for their organizations, and interact with the audience. 11-12 AM.

<u>Thursday Lunch</u>. Eat in fashionable surroundings in the company of beautiful people. Thursday's speaker is Merissa Sherrill Lynn, who has thought more about the need for IFGE and the mission of IFGE than any other of our community's leaders. Merissa will be introduced by Virginia Prince, to whom last year's Convention was dedicated, and who holds the all-time record for the most daughters (several hundred at last count). [Of the cost of these lunches to Convention members, \$10 is paid by a special fee and the remainder is financed by the Convention.]

Session 2c, subtitled <u>Problem Solving Rap Groups</u>, continues and concludes the <u>How to Form an Organization</u> sessions. Plan A will be to have only a single rap group, consisting of the panel interacting with the audience in a question/discussion period, terminated by a brief sum-up by the panel members. However if there is a demand, Plan B will be followed, under which a subgroup will split off to discuss one or more special issues. 2-3 PM Thursday.

Session 3 <u>Crossdressing Panel</u> is a logical early session to help define the central territory of the Convention; interesting to all, and a must for anyone inexperienced in the cross-dressing paraculture. The panel members will tell a little about themselves, and how crossdressing has impacted their lives, and will interact with the audience. 2-3 PM Thursday.

Session 4 <u>Special Interest Rap Groups</u>: (1): First session on D&S, moderated by Tara Tenille. This is an educational session for the general public rather than an in-group meeting. Session 5 <u>Religious Aspects</u>. Moderated by Sister Mary Elizabeth, of the Community of Saint Elizabeth. Panel members Veronica Brown, Merissa Lynn, Diane Dixon (?), Sharry Taylor, _____. What religious problems arise for members of the TV/TG/TS community? How can they be dealt with? 3-4 PM Thursday.

Session 6 <u>Marketing</u>. Moderated by Maureen Taylor. Panel members Yvonne Cooke, JoAnn Roberts, Brenda Atwater, Olivia Jensen. The merchandise in question includes our clubs and organizations; our meetings, fairs, conventions; our magazines, newsletters, publications; our referral services, hotlines, peer support. The customers include all of us, all who need us, and all others who are potentially helpful in any way to our cause. How can we reach this market more effectively? 7-9 PM Thursday.

How can our various groups help each other, and, by working together and sharing information and resources, do a better job of serving our community as a whole? What role can new technologies (eg. computer bulletin boards) play? How can plain old-fashioned communication and co-operation be fostered? What role should IFGE, as an umbrella organization, play? This articulate group will tell a little about themselves, their histories and experience, and interact with the audience. How can we express how important the underlying issues are to us, and how much we depend on, value and appreciate the help and support of our loved ones? How can we serve both our own needs and the needs of those closest to us? 2-4 PM Friday.

This session brings together experienced newsletter producers and editors, who will not only review the functions and values of newsletters, but also lead us through the technical matters involved in newsletter design and production. 7-9 PM Friday.

Session 13 <u>Feer Support</u>. Moderator Ginny Knuth, panel members Heather Peerson, Kim Hellman, ______, _____. How should first contacts with newcomers and potential new members be handled? What support is needed after a newcomer becomes a member ("inreach")? What outside services can and should an organization maintain? How about Significant Others? Lining up retail establishments? Activities out there in the world? Outreach? How can the necessary personnel be recruited, trained and kept enthusiastic? What types of services should <u>not</u> be attempted? Come and find out 7-9 PM Friday.

Session 15 <u>Counseling Techniques</u>. Moderator ______, Panel members ______, _____, _____, _____, What can counseling provide, and who can benefit from it? What different sorts of counselors and styles of counseling are available out there? How can one find a counselor or therapist with experience and a good track record in working with the TV/TG/TS community? Is finding a counselor or therapist necessarily a game of "blind man's bluff", or are there ways to shop around, assess alternatives and select knowingly? Can one gracefully "try out" a counselor, and when should one consider terminating? What are the special needs of transsexuals, how do they fit into our total community, and how can our total community better relate to those needs? 2-3 PM Saturday.
