BAGGAGE: IT CAN BE AN ASSET

Since I am a member of the gender community, I am very interested in what is written by other members of this community. Most of what I read is very helpful and supportive, but from time to time I run across articles or editorials that I do not agree with. I can accept this and I firmly believe that we all have the right to speak our minds, but when publications in our community tend to be decidedly negative in nature, without presenting positive or constructive alternatives, I feel something should be said. Let me explain.

Over the past few years, I have been reading a publication that is geared toward the transsexual portion of the gender community. While the information presented, for the most part, generally is good and factual, the publication tends to stress the negative and at times becomes very caustic, if not aggressively hostile, to certain groups. All I can guess is that the editor is not a content individual.

My transition has not been easy, and I would not recommend my approach as the only or "right" way to do it.....

She complains about how hard it is to eek out a living as a second class citizen, i.e. a woman, and how the world does not give transsexuals a fair shake. I would say that this is true of women in general, but that's not the point I wish to make here. I empathize with her, and I to feel that it's a "man's world" where women have to work much harder to succeed. However, I do not feel as she eludes, that women are doomed to mediocrity. Sure, if a person is not strong and lets the world walk over them, they will be among the down trodden. Sure, When a person presents a defeatist attitude, they invite failure. Sure, when a person is not willing to take chances, they will never reap the rewards of success. Therefore, we in the gender community, and more specificly, the transsexual portion of the community have to realize these statements as facts and work on their converse.

I am a pre-op transsexual. I have not openly stated this before but over the last few years I have been trying to understand my inner self, and am now comfortable saying that I am a transsexual. Anyway, I and a number of other transsexuals that I know personally, have not been trapped in the negative spiral that seems to have consumed many transsexuals. I started transitioning in my career over two years ago; have successfully made the transition; am accepted in my new feminine persona, and I can say that my approach has worked for me. I am a much happier person now; a much more outgoing individual, and I no longer feel that I am playing a role forced on me by society.

My transition has not been easy and I would not recommend my approach as the only or "right" way to do it, but in my case it worked. Over the last few years, I have made many sacrifices and given up many things, but I did not feel it necessary to throw away all the skills, work history, and career position that I had worked hard much of my adult life to achieve. Sure, my position was very shaky for a time, but I am a strong individual, an individual with enough guts and determination to show the world that I am a woman, capable of succeeding at what ever I attempt.

I realize now, that what I have done is not historically within the norm for transsexuals. The typical story seems to be "I gave it all up, started anew with no history, no skills, and am destined to be at the bottom of the social structure". I feel that this philosophy is based of an assumption that the experiences prior to our transition and our eventual acceptance contradicts the image we have of ourselves, and therefore, these experiences and all that is associated with them should be abandoned. This is

where I disagree. Historical baggage sometimes hurts and it can be a tremendous burden to carry but it is our past. We can never totally leave it behind. Nor can we completely hide it. There will always be times that we will be reminded of it, and from time to time, we will have to deal with isolated situations where we are "found out". Most secrets eventually are exposed and we are foolish to think that our past will never surface. Ideally, we should glean as much as possible from this past, using it to our advantage. Such things as close friends, our career skills, even business associates, and family ties thought to be non-transferable to our new persona, might well be salvaged.


