PROGRESS AT HOME

At the luncheon address given by Sister Mary Elizabeth a suggestion was made that in an effort to educate the community, those of us who are able might contact their hometown newspaper and offer to give an interview. One of our more courageous sisters, Jo Ann Fraser of Peoria IL, has done exactly that. The interview included photos of her transformation and was published in the Journal Star of Peoria on the last page of the Sports Section on Super Bowl Sunday of this year. Jo Ann had stipulated that her last name not be used and that anything clearly identifying her male persona not be published. These wishes were respected by the paper.

The photos and personal information in the article were specific enough when she went to work on Monday, many of the people she worked with had copies of the article and knew that it was about She dealt professionally with her. the reactions she encountered. She found that in a number of cases the reactions were positive and she had succeeded in enlightening a number of people. Through a series of circumstances precipitated in part by the article, her professional situation has changed...for the better.

THE PRISONER

There is an old legend of the Middle Ages that is very instructive. It seems that a citizen was arrested by one of the Barons and shut up in a dungeon in his castle. He was taken down dark stairs, down, down, down, by a ferocious-looking jailer who carried a great key a foot long.



The door of a cell opened, and he was thrust into a dark hole. The door shut with a bang, and there he was.

He lay in that dark dungeon for twenty years. Each day the jailer would come, the big door would be opened with a great creaking and groaning, a pitcher of water and a loaf of bread would be thrust in and the door closed again.

Well, after twenty years, the prisoner decided that he could not stand it any longer. He wanted to die but he did not want to commit suicide, so he decided that the next day when the jailer came, he would attack him. The jailer would then kill him in self defense, and thus his misery would be at an end. He thought he would examine the door carefully so as to be ready for tomorrow and, going over, he caught the handle and turned it. To his amazement the door opened and upon investigation, he found that there was no lock upon it and never has been, and that for all those twenty years, he had not been locked in, except in belief.

At any time in that period he could have opened the door if only he had known it. He thought it was locked, but it was not. He groped along the corridor and felt his way upstairs. At the top of the stairs, two soldiers were chatting, and they made no attempt to stop him. He crossed the great yard without attention. There was an armed guard on the drawbridge at the great gate, but he paid no attention to him, and he walked out a free man.

He went home unmolested and lived happily ever after. He could have done this any time through these long years since his arrest if he had known enough, but he did not. He was a captive, not of stone or iron, but of false belief. He was not locked in; he only thought he was. Of course this is only a legend, but it is an extremely instructive one.

We are all living in some kind of prison, some of us in one kind, some in another; some in a prison of lack, some in a prison of remorse and resentment, always the prison is in our thought and not in the nature of things.

Where do the Mermaids stand?

A long pause. A very long pause. "Where do the Mermaids stand?" says I.

"Yes. You see, I am a Mermaid." she said.

I said, "There are no such things as Mermaids."

"Oh yes, I am one!"

You see, she did not relate to being a Giant, a Wizard, or a Dwarf. She <u>knew</u> her category, Mermaid. And was not about to leave the game and go over and stand against the wall where a <u>loser</u> would stand. She intended to participate, wherever Mermaids fit into the scheme of things. Opening Congress of Representatives by Josephine W.

Following a good opening statement of mission by Wendy the Congress set about the daunting task of addressing 17 agenda items. The real challenge was that all 17 of the ideas were valuable and enjoyed considerable support. The first portion of the meeting was used to clarify the nature and scope of the agenda items by way of a question

Thursday, March 29, 1990 and answer session. Dealing with questions of implementation of specific ideas was avoided to allow the concepts to be clarified in the time allowed. The items receiving the most questions did not necessarily get picked as the most important. Once the questions were answered it was time to prioritize. A ballot form listing the short name of each item was completed by each representative. Each idea was given a different number value of one to seventeen with one indicating the highest priority and seventeen the lowest. The sum of the priority numbers for each item resulted in ordering the items in their order of priority (see Table on the next page).

The pattern which emerged from this ordering process showed that there was considerable interest in three conceptual areas. These areas are Organizational development, Regional issues and Outreach. The Congress determined to work toward implementing the highest priority item in each of these areas in the next year. Because of the closeness of several items in priority parts of those items may be included.

The meeting was completed by getting volunteer " Project Mothers" for the three areas of interest. Alison Lang will be nurturing the Organizational Development area with the production of a groups "how to" manual being the specific project. The Regional Issues area will be handled by Jane Fee with the regional events calendar being the first task. Barbara McClorey will mother the Outreach area starting with the regional speakers bureau.

During this week these three leaders will be forming groups and

scheduling meeting to get additional input and work out an implementation plan.

One final outcome was that the Congress expressed considerable support for beginning an advertisement program in the mainstream world to let potential members of our community know there is support available. This would also let the mainstream world get to know us. This type of project would require the IFGE to commit to the initial production and design but the Congress could use their local community resources to get the ads placed.
