ETVC's Potential

With the fabulous success of the 5th Miss ETVC Cotillion more ETVC members are discovering the enormous potential of our club. In the last five years ETVC has grown from 70 members to 330 and still growing strong. We have socials, rap groups, couples, poker parties and more, but what else can we do as group?

Where do we go from here?

ETVC is growing at an exponential rate, and the time has finally come for it to become incorporated as a nonprofit corporation, but for this to happen several things must occur.

First, the office of coordinator needs a name change to president. We will also need to create a new office of vice-president and we will need to establish an education committee. The new corporation would also require a board of directors who will help with ideas and advice. Finally, the focus of the group needs to shift some to more educational activities.

None of this means taking away any of the socials or other activities that we now sponsor, but it does mean that several educational activities need to be added.

I have worked on the idea of incorporating as a nonprofit for over four years and I feel that it is now the time to seriously consider it.

ETVC in the 90s!

Imagine these possibilities: A new member joins and in her packet is a course schedule for makeup, voice, fashion, etc. The classes are taught every month in a 2-3 day seminar at a local hotel. She discovers that she can take Gender 101 being taught by ETVC members at U.C. Berkeley. ETVC members are teaching about TV/TS/TG at the Human Sexuality Institute to help the new therapists. Our packet describes the new TV sitcom called TGIF "Transgenderism is fun" on Channel 4. New pamphlets, books, video tapes, audio tapes and documentaries are being generated by our committees. All of this and more is possible.

What else is needed for ETVC?

The biggest factor in a strong group is a strong central organization with active members, but especially members who want to be officers of the largest single chapter gender group in the U.S.

In April we nominate members for office in ETVC, but before then we will try to make members aware of what the duties of the officers are and encourage as many people as possible to run. ETVC can do great things, but it is up to the members to make it great. Active participation for committees is needed. The next time someone asks you about running for office or getting involved in ETVC just remember: ETVC has tremendous potential, but it is up to all of us to help it grow and prosper.

MISS ETVC 1989 - SUSAN!



More than 200 people, the largest ever for an ETVC event, saw Susan become the 5th Miss ETVC at Cotillion 1989.

Susan, who succeeded Kimberly Ann for the title, wowed the audience with an exuberant version of "Hey Big Spender" from the show "Sweet Charity". Susan's performance was one of several showstoppers at the California Club event.

One of the more memorable performances came from Randi, who was first runner-up and winner of the Best Talent award for her performance of "Rio de Janeiro Blue." Michelle was second runner-up and winner of the Best Legs competition. Tied for third runner-up were Kimberly and Sheryl.

The show, which is getting larger and better each year, was produced by Diane. It was her second Cotillion and definitely not her last, though next year she hopes to direct rather than produce the show.

"Next year I want to put my talents into the creative rather than the administrative side of the show," Diane said.

"Backstage things went well this year," she said, though there was one little vignette she won't soon forget.

"Sharona who was going to do the male impersonation of Billy Idol was back there trying to hide her breasts while all the men were asking for help putting on their bras," she said. "It was quite an interesting contrast."

Besides the finalists and winners, the other contestants included Dale, Kate, Kim, Teri, Kristyn and Martina.

Emceeing the show were Phoebe Planters and Tommi Rose, two great and funny ladies who really kept things moving.

Special thanks to them and to Tatianna, who flew in specially from Reno to entertain us all.

Passing Comments

We are growing at a faster and faster pace. New members are joining the club in increasing numbers, and the publicity from the Cotillion is likely to bring us more new faces in the coming months.

Perhaps we need to realize now that we aren't a small group of close friends who know each other and agree on what we are all doing. Neither are we a group of people who are all at the same level of experience with dressing.

As we grow, we can expect more folks who are newly out of the closet and perhaps in the throes of what one psychologist aptly calls "blowout." Maybe you remember it or are looking forward to it.

It is that time when you want to tell everyone about everything you do. You want EVERYONE who is the least bit supportive to be involved with everything you do too. Anyone who is pleasant is a possible best friend because you share the same secret.

As a group we have to be understanding. At socials we all have to be a bit prepared to deal with blowout. We have to moderate out-of-control behavior without - and this very important - destroying the joy of being out of the closet.

We can't encourage potentially harmful conduct or ideas - going public without considering the implications. Things that sound great in the heat of blowout may be something to regret later. Leading someone to believe you are their best friend simply because you are friendly and sympathetic and not telling them that you would like to let things develop slowly can be a problem. We aren't therapists either. Be realistic but don't burst their bubbles either.

The excitement and joy of finding a place where you can express something that's been bottled up and hidden behind a structure of lies is pretty wonderful and should be savored. So let's try to do our best with every new blowout case and

help them enjoy the new territory they've discovered. Try TO remember what it was like for you when it was new and try to be the guide or big sister you wished you had then.

More new people also means more personalities and different styles of crossdressing. As we are an open group we have to expect that everyone may not share the same goals or aesthetic sensibilities.

For the most part, the average person at a social is pretty demure-dressy, but demure. We are a remarkably conventional bunch. We seem to be trying to be our unconventional selves in the most conventional ways. And yet many of us are working out a kind of public or semi-public presentation of our fantasies.

I notice that I'm always a bit put off at first by someone who doesn't share my style of dressing. I realize that I have to be open to people who aren't on my fashion wavelength.

We needn't all be demure middle class matrons. I may not want to be seen with you at three in the afternoon if you're wearing a prom gown and six inch heels, but I can appreciate the look at the Chez. Fantasy tempered with a realistic appraisal of where it is best expressed is the idea. I don't exactly believe in passing, but you can choose how much attention you will get by how you match your surroundings.

ETVC socials should be where there's room for everyone's expression and we can enjoy the variety. Let's try to be as open as we can be - we are always saying how we want acceptance so let's start with acceptance "at home." Don't look down your nose at someone who doesn't meet your exacting standards, be they passing or whatever.

I have this soapbox simply because I take the time to write. I'm interested in your reactions. Write if you agree, disagree or can say it better. -Thalia

Susan and Randi, the top finishers in the Fifth Annual Miss ETVC Cotillion, had more in common than just the stunning performances that floored a packed house at the California Club.

Both have long ties to the entertainment world, and both were performing for the first time in their feminine personas, though one could hardly have guessed that from a seat in the audience.

"I've been a performer; I sang briefly with Stan Kenton once, but I wanted to do it as a woman," said Susan, who would be crowned Miss ETVC that night. "I've been before big crowds; I guess the biggest was about 80,000, but this was real different and I was still nervous as hell!"

Nervous or not, Susan's enthusiastic and saucy rendition of "Hey Big Spender" lit up the crowd of 200-plus.

But there was more to come as Randi, who earns her living as an entertainer in her male persona, simply crushed the audience with a rendition of "Rio De Janeiro Blue" that had them yelling for more in a standing o. Randi walked off with the Best Talent award and was first runner up to Susan as Miss ETVC.

Those who saw the show might find it hard to believe that Randi has been a member of ETVC only since November 1988 and is very recently out of the closet. Public appearances as a woman are quite new to her and have raised some interesting personal issues.

"The night before the show my ex-wife called and said she was afraid I'd be humiliated," Randi said. She said the ex-wife's concern was that there would be negative media exposure as a result of

the performance, something Randi, too, had worried about.

"When Diane (the producer) said that television and the Examiner would be there, I was extremely apprehensive," she said. "But I just thought it was something I didn't have to be ashamed of, especially being involved in the TS experience and all that entails," she said. "This (transsexualism) is nothing I've asked for, and it is something I have to deal with in all its levels. This was just an opportunity to get my feet wet."

Randi did indeed get her feet wet and appeared live on Channel 2 during the show.

"Two girl friends saw it live and later they said I looked great. Since then they've offered to go shopping with me!"

While both Susan and Randi said they had plenty of fun doing the show they also recognized that the Cotillion was much more than just a good-time experience.

As the winner, Susan will be representing the club, and by extension all cross-dressers, to a basically unenlightened general public.

"I guess the thing is that I hope I can project some class and dignity to people I may speak to," Susan said.

"I'm sure I'll be asked if all cross-dressers are like me since most people don't know much about us," Susan said. "Obviously I don't represent everybody, since there are so many different kinds of people in ETVC, but I hope I can get across that we are just people like anyone else," she said.

Randi expressed similar views: "Augusta (one of the judges) asked what I would

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Which Restroom?

Editor's Note: Should TVs be allowed to use women's restrooms? Our outreach people inform us that the question of which restroom TVs use in public facilities is almost always asked when they participate in public presentations and speeches. It is also a question new members of our club, both male and female, ask when they attend our socials.

As we become more visible this issue is likely to also become a matter of more general concern, but right now it is already at the center of a rather nasty little argument between the editors of the Emerald City News, a newsletter for a Seattle TV organization, and Twenty Minutes, the voice of the XX Club of Massachusetts, a TS organization.

The editor of the TV newsletter backs allowing TVs to use the ladies room while the editor of the TS newsletter is basically against it. The question itself arose as a result of statements made to the Seattle Times newspaper by an assistant city attorney who said that a TV did not have the right under a new anti-discrimination ordinance to use a women's restroom.

Our Rights Attacked!

(In an article advising club members what to say in letters to city officials:) Point out in your letter that:

The ordinance specifically states that there shall be no discrimination in any public facilities (and it names public restrooms) against any sexual minority (and it names transvestites).

Your purpose as a transvestite in the ladies room is to answer nature's call and powder your nose - just like any other lady in there.

No incidents have been reported. In fact most women have been either amused at first or didn't care.

The abuse, discrimination and violence visited upon transvestites just because somebody "didn't feel comfortable around them" is rooted in the same prejudice that violated the rights of blacks, gays and women until the recent victories for civil rights.

We are not transvestites by choice. We were born this way. We have a clear track record of responsibility.

The violation of one minority's rights is a violation of all citizen's rights. Transvestites are citizens, voters, residents, and taxpayers, too, and Seattle should be proud to lead the nation in its commitment to protect all minorities-including transvestites.



Toilet Training - A Rebuttal by Veronica Jean Brown

Twenty Minutes—December 1988

A male transvestite is a man and has no business in a woman's toilet, crossdressed or not. A M-F transsexual, whether pre or post-op, who knowingly doesn't pass as a woman also has no business in a woman's toilet...The right to use sexually or gender-designated public restrooms is determined by anatomical plumbing, secondary sexual characteristics and not by the covering of the body.

I've been in a few gay bars where persons of both sexes freely used either restroom but these were small enough to only allow one person in at a time...

If a male transvestite is passable enough and can get away with it, go ahead, let him use the women's restroom. If a transvestite knows he doesn't pass and 95% of them don't, let him use the urinals and the urinals ain't in the women's toilets. Let the male transvestite exist in the real world as a man in drag (and not a 'lady') and let him find acceptance there as thousands of transsexuals have done. I'm in favor of transvestite groups going out in public and using designated men's rooms, either men's or women's. But don't hide behind a local ordinance prohibiting discriminatory practices against other minorities. This makes a travesty of minority and gay civil rights.



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While estimates are vague and based on very flimsy research, it is believed that about one percent of the U.S. adult male population are true transvestites. That works out to more than 800,000 male TVs, plus an unknown number of MTF transsexuals nationwide. Locally, this would mean there are roughly 17,000 male TVs in the Bay Area.

Despite these large numbers, TVs and transsexuals have long been an isolated minority. It has only been in the last decade that TV/TS social organizations like ETVVC have become widespread in the U.S.

Now a national organization of TV/TS groups has emerged and is organizing along with ETVVC the first open convention of cross-dressers in history.

Merissa Sherrill Lynn is a founder and director of the International Foundation for Gender Education (IFGE) which is holding its 3rd annual convention, but the first open to "rank and file" members of the gender community and their friends, on April 4-9 in San Francisco at the San Franciscan Hotel.

ETVC: What is the purpose of IFGE?

Merissa: The idea behind IFGE is what we call symbiotic synergism. There are all kinds of different entities (in the gender community) ...IFGE's job is to create the synergy for all these (groups) to work together and create an effect that is greater than what a single organization can do on its own.

ETVC: So IFGE is like an umbrella organization for all the TV/TS groups around the country?

Merissa: IFGE is less an umbrella than a unifying factor (for TV/TS organizations nationwide) and a place where everybody can say their piece and work on mutually beneficial projects. For instance, IFGE is coming to California with a convention that is intended to be the community's convention...people who serve us will be here to show us their wares, but it is also intended to strengthen the local

organizations and services. As we build and grow, we hope to move the convention around to other cities to help strengthen the groups in those cities.

ETVC: It is interesting that crossdressers have organized enough to actually have conventions. Where were the other conventions and what were they like?

Merissa: Both were in Chicago, but they were oriented to movers and shakers in the gender community. This is the first convention that is open to broader participation; anyone can come and hopefully it will be a good time for everybody even though there will still be an emphasis on seminars that are aimed at the people who sweat bullets for this community.

The reason the first two conventions were more limited is that our community hasn't ever really been a community, just a mishmash of individuals doing their own thing. So the first order of business was to develop a sense of community on a national level and that meant getting our own collective act together. This was done by drawing together the most active people around the country and bringing them together to discuss the issues and problems we all share.

But now we feel that with that step taken there is no reason to exclude everybody else.

ETVC: Transvestites and transsexuals have been around forever, but it sounds to me like you are saying that a national organization, no less a convention, is very new.

Merissa: Oh yes, we are all plain old neophytes, just beginners. Before what is happening now, the only person who caused any kind of national awareness for the gender community was Lee Brewster (now owner of Lee's Mardi Gras Boutique in NY, which was also one of the first openly TV/TS stores). What people always forget about the beginning of Gay Liberation was that it was all started by drag queens at the Stonewall.

Out of that, Brewster started the Queens Liberation Front (in the early 1970s). It was a great idea but it was tied too closely to the gay community and had very little to offer for the mainstream community, most of whom wanted nothing to do with it.

Still Brewster was the only person in the whole country who was stressing community...but it was still drag and couldn't be sustained.

ETVC: But doesn't the special nature of cross-dressing make it a lot harder to develop local organizations, not to mention a national one?

Merissa: Well of course, I mean think about this: we have an office here that people can call for information and so on. Do you know that this is the first time that representatives of our community have had an office in this country as far as we know?

The problem for us and for developing a truly strong community like the gay community is that most people who cross-dress have no reason to get out of the closet. A lot crossdress when the mood strikes and don't need to be with other people. So they are in and out as far as dressing, and that makes it very, very difficult to generate the leadership and dedication and work force who will work on other people's behalf.

All you have to do to see this is look at ETVVC or any other group: there are plenty of people who are members of ETVVC who only show up when the mood strikes, not many of those people are going to take leadership or even very active roles in the community.

ETVC: Given all the difficulties of organizing crossdressers, what is in the future for IFGE?

Merissa: Ultimately we hope to develop a trust and foundation with grant money to develop outreach projects and research projects built around the goal of further developing a true community.

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Coming to the Convention?

So you say you can't afford the IFGE convention in April?

We say you can't afford to miss this fabulous opportunity to meet and learn from gender community leaders from around the country and world! People from everywhere are taking their vacations, paying air fares and hotel accommodation rates just to have the opportunity to have what you have--access to a great gender convention in San Francisco!!

The convention runs from April 4-9, with a pre-registration day of activities on April 3, and will be at the San Franciscan Hotel.

You have all kinds of options for participating. You can sign up for the full convention - \$205 individual or \$350 per couple - which includes the San Francisco Bay cruise, the banquet, Sunday's brunch and ETVC'S Showtime (otherwise \$15 by itself). You can sign up for any three days - \$175 individual and \$275 couple; a Friday - Saturday package, \$125 per person; or single days for \$75 person.

ETVC is sponsoring all sorts of activities events during the convention including shopping and cultural tours as well as a social, but the ONLY way to take advantage of these unique events is to register for the convention or volunteer to help out a specific event.

You can offer to help ETVC with hostessing, taking registration, guiding tours, decorating the Chez or taking part in Showtime. Helping ETVC doesn't cost anything except your time, but you can still be part of the action and mingle with many truly marvelous people.

We encourage you to make your plans now to do whatever you can to take advantage of the convention being held in our own backyard. ETVC is proud to be the host organization for the IFGE convention—we are a great group, and we will be delighted to show off our gorgeous girls and beautiful city.

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
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Officer Elections

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Coming Out At Work by Kim

The 6 and 10 o'clock news broadcasts were well done, but I was also very recognizable as a male and as a transvestite. I prepared Sunday night for work the next day by putting some photos of me as Kim in a photo book, as well as some TV pamphlets (never leave home without them!)

On Monday morning, I entered my shared office at work and the first person, the guy collecting computer paper said, "Didn't I see you on the news?" I was nervous and said, "Yes, that was me." I was comforted by his reaction but nervous about the next person's reaction. An assembly gal said, "I saw you on the news?" and so the day went with six people coming up and talking about transvestism with me and wanting to see my pictures. By Tuesday, a lot of people had heard and were saying "Did you know that Jim was on television wearing a dress?" Prepared with my photo book, some nerve and the ability to answer a lot of questions, I had a nice week.

The best comments were from several gals who said, "I bet you know more about makeup than I do!"

A lot of people in the company will never approach me because they are not mature enough to discuss the subject. I have been successful because I've been at the company for four years, and people have worked with me in all kinds of situations.

It's nice to be able to discuss fashion or make-up. But I also know a lot of people will have difficulty understanding my hobby at all. I know I can lose acquaintances, but not any friends.

The freedom to discuss gender is nice, but deep down inside I wonder if I was ready for this. Fifteen years out of the closet, four years plus as coordinator of ETVC and active in groups, and yet I live in the real world where prejudice and bigotry are all too real.

I'm enjoying myself now but there is a very long way to go before people can accept transvestites and transsexuals for who they are: people.
