MURIEL SUGGESTS...

A terrific opaque foundation that does a great job in transforming a bearded shadow into a smooth illusionary transparent women's complexion is Covermark. This product was created by Lydia O'Leary to cover a hideous flaming "port wine stain" mark covering one side of her face from chin to forehead. With the help of a chemist, after many experiments using a variety of ingredients she discovered the wonderful formula for a creamy foundation cream which would completely cover and disguise the disfiguring birth mark so no one could possibly detect it. Little did she realize she also discovered the perfect disguise for a dark grey "beard shadow" that would disfigure a women's face if she were actually a man. Now, thanks to Lydia and her wonderful line of foundation cosmetics "his" skin can pass for "her" skin. It can be set with powder for a soft matte finish and is actually waterproof; does not rub off on clothing and will only come off entirely with makeup remover. So perfect for both fantasy and reality!

THE FOUNDATION

Pick two shades -- one that matches the all over skin color and a lighter shade, perhaps 2 or 3 times lighter depending on the darkness of the "shadow."

Apply the lighter shade around the eye area, over the beard and mustache area and down to the neck - just enough to cover the shadow area. Blend the edges at the line of the skin.

Cover the rest of the face and the lighter areas with the darker shade and blend the two shades together using just enough foundation to cover and look natural. Too heavy an application will look artificial. If one has deep or enlarged pores a little heavier application should be made in that area, working the foundation down into the pores - heavy enough to make the skin smooth looking.

That's it for now. Next issue let's do cream rouge, contouring or shading cream and highlights.

In regards to fashion, we can always use a new outlook to passability in the making of a total female self. As we sisters start our venture out to different events and special social parties, we need to look our best and dress our best, as a model of womanhood today.

To look attractive in the world of fashion simply requires knowledge of which blends of make-up will enhance one's appearance. Lighting is one of the most important aspects in determining one's appearance, whether it be indoor or outdoor light as you apply makeup before leaving home.

The lighting should be positioned around the bathroom or vanity mirrors, similar to those found in stage dressing rooms. Makeup application should be thinner and lighter when outside because of the great visibility in the sunlight. Color makes a big difference in makeup, in regard to how it works and how we are seen in the public eye as a women. I have found blue and green makeup and other soft colors add contrast that is produced by cool lighting. Colors such as peach, bronze and others of this tone work best in candlelight rooms or in low incandescent lighting. This type of lighting has golden overtones. All makeup can be applied more heavily for night time activities to provide a more elegant look. Use a small cosmetic sponge to carefully apply the makeup, gently patting it on without wiping. Wiping on makeup will leave streaks and patches. Finish with a translucent powder lightly applied.

TO PASS OR NOT TO PASS. Some thoughts by JoAnn Roberts

I so often hear from TV sisters about how they went out somewhere and "passed." They are so excited that they were able to be out in public and be themselves that I just don't have the heart to tell them the truth. The truth is that very, very few TVs are able to pass. What is happening is that the girls are confusing social tolerance or indifference with being accepted as a female. More

often than not, John Q. and Jane Q. Public are too wrapped up in their own words to notice us as we "pass" by them. If we had done a good job of makeup and our clothing is appropriate for the time and season, they will assume that we are what we appear to be: women. That, however, is not passing as a female. One slip is all it takes to jar the attention of the casual observer into the realization that something is amiss, and that you ain't a miss.

At the risk of creating unnecessary labels, one can postulate a series of stages which, with a great deal of practice, can lead to passing. The first stage is one which I just described, being casually mistaken as a female. The next stage is when your appearance can withstand close scrutiny, say from within two feet of another person. The third stage is more difficult, but obtainable for many, and that is a brief conversation. If you can reach stage three you're doing great and you probably are one of those people who really can "pass". The next obvious stage is to be able to engage in prolonged conversation and not have your listener "read" you. The last and ultimate stage occurs when you are accepted for a female regardless of your mode of dress.

Now think about this. It takes most transsexuals about two years of living full time as a woman to develop their new personas. They spend 24 hours a day working on their movements, actions, speech patterns, etc. so that they will be able to live and work within our society and be accepted as a female. Isn't it a little presumptuous to assume that a TV who gets out in public once or twice a year, or even once or twice a month, is passing? I have had sisters recount to me their exploits in shopping malls or downtown areas and I tell you they would not fool my young niece into thinking they were women.

So what happens? They delude themselves into believing that they can now go anywhere, anytime when crossdressed. And, the next time they get "read", they're crushed.

The goal that both TVs and TSs should be working toward is one of self-confidence and internal validation./ I have heard stories about TVs who "look down" upon those who do not appear totally feminine and I have heard stories about TSs who have committed suicide because they could not make the grade as a woman. In both cases these people are overlooking the more important aspect of self worth. Your value as a human being is intrinsic and not in any way related to whether or not you can pass.

Being the best you can be is a laudable goal in any endeavor, but "passing" should not be the end of all your existence. The question to ask is, "Can I pass for a Human Being?" When the answer is "YES", then be proud of yourself!

CROSSDRESSING FOR THE MASSES

How many of you have experienced the joys of being a "tomboy"?

When my husband was confronted by his mother about his crossdressing, she asked "Don't you want to grow up to be a man?" He answered (since he loved his mother very much), "No, I want to be just like you." His mother was quite upset about this. When, as little girls, we expressed a desire to be like our fathers when we grew up, we were patted on the head and our fathers were extremely pleased. Think about this; We in this country, have a double standard for both female and male. The things that are available to you are not to your mate, and vice versa. Think about the restrictions put on males in our society, and not on females. We may feel like a "second-class" citizen from time to time, because we are women, but remember, we can express ourselves as a "male" if we so desires. He has no such option.

Think of it this way. You have a lot in common with your man, as you are both crossdressers. All of us ladies have, at one time or another, worn jeans and men's shirts, and now boxer shorts are in vogue. We're still the same person, no matter what we have on. Our men are no different. He's still the same man in your life.

Haven't you ever had a hard day at work, and looked forward to getting home and jumping into a comfortable

pair of jeans and a baggy (usually his) t-shirt? Our men are no different. They are often under a lot of pressure at work, and usually are the major decision-maker at home. They also need to relax, need a release, and this is the softest one I can think of.

You must also remember that while we are able to change our attitudes toward crossdressing, if we so desire, crossdressers do not have that luxury. No one makes a conscious decision to be a crossdresser. Would you choose to lead a life of guilt and fear that your "secret" would be found out?

We women also need to stop using terms such as transvestite, transgenderist, transsexual, etc. These are clinical words which make a crossdresser feel as if he were on display under glass and that his mate thinks of him as a line in a textbook. Try to think of him as a "crossdresser", an innocent term for an innocent activity. So our man likes to dress at times, as we do. Is that really so bad? Aren't we, in this society, always asking men to get in touch with their feelings? When our men want to experience what we, as women, feel about things, it should be taken as a compliment, not an affront or insult.
