GOVERNOR WHITMAN MEETS M.O.T.G.!

MAY 9, 1994, STATE HOUSE, TRENTON, NJ -- M.O.T.G. Co-Director Terry M. represented the transgendered community in a high level meeting with Governor Christine Todd Whitman. This meeting was set up under the auspices of the NJ Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual communities. It was designed to present to Governor Whitman issues of importance to all. The main topics of discussion included civil rights, bias awareness, youth, family issues, and AIDS. In her presentation to the Governor, Terry explained briefly what it means to be transgendered and also pointed out the fact that under civil rights law, transgendered people are not protected. Governor Whitman indicated a willingness to maintain an ongoing relationship with all our communities.

In all likelihood, this is the first time any New Jersey governor has met a representative of our community!

Current circumstances have allowed me plenty of time to visit malls. Seems as if stores are always having sales and there are always plenty (Continued on page 5)

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of people around. Shopping during the day off peak hours is quite pleasant no matter how you are dressed. Sales people are glad to see you and they re very talkative and helpful. The cosmetics and fine fragrance sales girls are usually the most thrilled to hear that you are a crossdresser and a consumer -- they will try to sell you the store!

Since money is always in short supply, you can tell something about the person by what she buys. This article is about personal growth of the typical crossdresser. It suggests that changes in what you buy reflect periods of growth on the way to becoming a mature and contemporary woman. Like many others, my years in the "closet" were spent as a lingerie queen and nobody did chiffon and lace peignoir sets like me. I was the best -- just ask my spouse. Crinolines? Of course, by the dozen. Now we must hide them from the kids. How many crinolines can one stuff in a four foot Lane Cedar Chest?

Seven years ago Renaissance was formed in May 1987, and I answered the call to leave the closet. Creating and presenting a new woman to the world was a "social birth" for me. Those previous years in the closet are akin to time spent in the womb (chiffon). So the average American crossdresser has the longest gestation time of any species on the planet!

Growth is a natural process -- to accelerate it at "warp" speed produces poor results. The longest stage of growth is adolescence. Going through adolescence at age 40 is not funny but really painful: this time with a more rounded figure -- all in the wrong places.
