FROM THE FOUNDER

The Benjamin Association Symposium takes place every two years, and this time it was held in Vancouver, Canada. This symposium is one of the places where the world comes together to talk about gender and gender identity issues. I have been a member for many years, presented papers before this group, and have announced my own research (with my research partner, Bryant Vehrs) through the medium of this professional organization. I think there are many myths about what Benjamin is and what it does.

Benjamin is what they call a professional organization and there is little mystery to this name, it simply means that this is the place where formal research and study is presented to others who are engaged in similar study. That's it Benjamin isn't a conference like the yearly IFGE or Southern Comfort events. Surgeons, researchers, therapists and many other professionals get together and tell each other what they have discovered about gender and gender identity. Or at least they offer what they believe to be new knowledge about these issues. As with any knowledge there can be a lot of wrong turns and mistakes, but the point is that everybody is trying to understand, and everyone has agreed to recognize when new information comes along and changes old views. The new ideas don't find instant acceptance, they have to be looked at, discussed, researched and tested. That is the way of careful science and careful thought.

Of course, all this work toward careful study doesn't mean there can't be a lot of rot dished up along the way. That is how it goes in any research, and the way it has gone for a long time, ever since the scientific method came along and started to ask the "why" question in a structured way. I know that there is always room at a good professional conference for debate and discussion. So it is with Benjamin.

Some years ago the debate was awfully one-sided. The talk was often about transsexual and other gender identity issues as symptoms of some deeper malady, a malady that needed control. That time and that thinking is long past. The Benjamin Association is full of professionals who get the point these days, the point that gender and gender identity are basic parts of us, parts that are not symptoms of some illness, or some "craziness"

Back in the beginning the Benjamin organization got going as a response to threats from outside, threats from medicine and law that were hovering around the notion that if changing gender identity or role wasn't a recognized condition than it ought to be controlled and even stopped. Benjamin was set up largely to protect both the courageous few who were going through transitions and the courageous few who were helping them.

But things go along and egos flourish and complications pile up---so that even the best intentions seem to put on masks of confusion and power. For a while one set of ideas gets the upper hand, ideas like the purely medical model of treatment for everything. Other ideas have to wait a bit and get organized before the real values of honest research start to weed out the things that don't work. For another example, the old concepts of psychoanalysis that once held sway are now being carefully reexamined, they no longer are taken as the royal road to true knowledge of the mind. I think this sort of process is what has happened with the Benjamin Association, and that is why I still put my energy and confidence in it. And I always remember Benjamin is only one of many ways of working the gender question, there are a lot of others I put my confidence in as well, such as the group support system of self-help we pioneered here at Ingersoll.

And the Standards of Care are a part of this drama. Sometimes it seems that the Standards are the only things that are ever associated with Benjamin. I know why, too, at least I think I do. As we come to terms with who we are, it is not necessarily pleasant to be told there are some guidelines, some "Standards" out there that might grab hold of our lives and direct us along. The answer we have always given at Ingersoll is this. We know you will do what you will, go your own way, but let's see if there are ways to go that bring less pain, less anguish and more joy into your life. That is how we use the Standards of Care of the Benjamin Association, as guidelines to assist us in the search for complete selves, complete persons.

So even though most of the conference time at any Benjamin meeting is devoted to new research and discussion, the thing we most hear about afterwards is the Standards. Now things have changed, now every voice can have a place because there is a committee of "consumers"—that is us—giving ideas and advice to every decision that affects what is written into the Standards of Care. Jude Patton, a Board member at Ingersoll, and Sheila Kirk, MD are the Chairpersons of this committee. When the revision of the Standards of Care is published in a few months, let's have a worldwide discussion. Let's talk these things over in our own ways.

You know when you look around that there are some people who will do well in whatever process they take on, and others who are clearly bound for troubles, and still others who are so filled with problems that they must certainly be in for a very hard struggle if they attempt transitions. The Benjamin guidelines assist people it every situation, and on all sides, the helpers and the people helped.

I say Benjamin should exist for all these people---if the individuals themselve choose to use the discoveries of the Benjamin Association. If individuals choose not to use the Standards there is no fist from the sky that will come to stop them from any path they want to travel. There is, however, a growing understanding among the professionals we use—surgeons, endrocronlogists, therapists and the trest--that there really are better ways to be sure that safe and effective help is given

They use the Standards for the best reasons, our success and our health. They are flexible, they match the service to the need. At the same time the number of providers is also growing, and finally there is real choice for us. In the old times there were few places to turn and we were stuck with whatever rules were in vogue. Nowadays we ourselves have created many ways to get the help we need. We know that the Standards are guidelines, and that they must respond to new knowledge. If they did not we would no longer use them. Not only that, but the Benjamin Association itself realizes this! The object is professional care, not control for control's sake. But we must be watchful and we must always educate ourselves.

Here is a challenge for us. Can we craft a new alliance among all who are personally facing questions of gender and gender identity and all who are at work in fields of study that relate to understanding gender? (Sometimes theses are one and the same...) I answer my own question with a Yes! Of course we can work together. Why not? We are not fools, and neither are the researchers and caregivers of the world---at least most of them are not, isn't that so? Help for those who need and want help. A clear recognition that some people have lives that are driven by confusions and illnesses. A clear recognition that not all people are similar and some will go about their gender issues is unique ways. A clear vision that some people will have such pain that they will need to come in from the cold of their experiences and look for help. A recognition of the quiet struggles that may be brewing in folks separated from transsexual and transgender communities. And a sure knowledge of the great joys and the great successes that go with a free and deep exploration among the genders and identities of the world.

Shall we ask the old questions again? The questions about what constitutes real help for people who are changing genders and lives, and the questions about what if any, should be the guidelines that we set up to direct this help?

'HEY, GOOD COOKIN!'

Left-Over Jack-'O-Lantern

Jack-'O-Lantern. What do you do with him after the holiday is over. Most folks either throw them away or let them rot on the front porch and then get rid of them. Here's three creative (and delicious) things to do with that scary punkin. (Note: It is recommended that you do not carve the pumpkin, but draw and/or paint on it instead. Carved pumpkins may spoil and be un-usable.)

Ingredients:

Jack-'O-Lantern after he is through scaring folks.

AND A VARIETY OF 'STUFF':

Chopped Onions; Butter or Margarine

Gooey Marshmallow Topping
White and Brown sugar
Salt and Pepper to taste
Onion or Garlic Salt

Preparation:

I. Cut pumpkin up. Scrape out the seeds and stringy insides. (Throw away strings, but don't throw away the seeds. Clean them, place them on a cookie sheet, sprinkle them with onion or garlic salt and roast them in a 350 degree oven for about 15 minutes, then cat them like sunflower seeds. They're delicious.)

11. Peel and dice pumpkin flesh. Place in a casserole. Cover with Pumpkin Pie spices and marshmallow topping. Cover and bake in a 250 degree oven until pumpkin is soft (20-40 minutes). Remove the covering for the last 15 minutes to brown the top.

III. Cut up the pumpkin into large pieces (4-5 inches square). Put several pats of butter of margarine on each slice. Top with chopped onions. Wrap in foil and bake in a 350 degree oven until a fork can pierce the pumpkin easily.

FTM SUPPORT GROUPS CHANGE TIMES


The FTM Support groups have been reorganized and seven FTM's have come forward to become facilitators, reported David Director of FTM Resources on the Ingersoll Board of Directors.
