Rather than uncritically accepting the burden of isolation, or shame, negative uniqueness or deviance, or the unexamined prejudices of others, it helps for those of us in the crossdresser/transgenderist community to achieve a larger sense of self by seeing the ways in which we have always fit into the total scheme of things.

Knowledge of our existence and roles as reveled in the various cultural traditions, spiritual disciplines, mythologies and literature since ancient times has the power to expand our own thinking about ourselves in positive and realistic ways.

Somewhere deep within our core even the most fearful, disgraced and self-abnegating of us has that intuition and idea - however fragile and un-affirmed - that this feminine dimension that we possess, with its desires, dreams, needs and energy, is very right and natural, and even sacred. Especially sacred, for it is an expression of Creation itself and it is essential to the spiritual progress of this world - its healing, its peace, and its need for joyful challenge and adventure.

There are those other people in this world who, even though they may not be crossdressers or transgendered people, either already understand this principle of difference and diversity and will affirm you for what you are or they will come to understand it through their contact with you if they recognize you as a person of self esteem, peace, and courage.

It is possible to just will oneself out of the closet, physically, but often we are still in conflict within in unnecessary ways, most often because we internalize the ways we are, or imagine ourselves to be, in conflict with an unaccepting society. In addition to desire and need, we may require an alliance with something that is greater than ourselves – and whether this something greater be pride, as in community, relationship with a guide or mentor, or the active support of friends and sisters, the ultimate nature of this alliance will be spiritual, that is it will have the power to actually transcend the barriers to honest and open self expression.

Self expression is growth, and growth, paradoxically, is not adding to something. It is a releasing of something, an unfolding of what is already there or within. This is the true nature of what is already there or within. This is the true nature of what we call change: it is a going-back-to; it is a giving up of the false or convenient, a letting-go of what is easy for others to accept but ultimately destructive of you.

Opportunities, or potential turning points, for change present themselves to us now and then. Sometimes we think we are ready, other times not. Various cultural traditions take it upon themselves to create or indicate the various stages of growth and change, and in this way responsibility is taken out of the hands of the individual. The transition from one way of living to another, if not always expected, is encouraged or at least honored and affirmed. Usually, it is celebrated.

In a real sense, we are people who have always worn skirts or dresses, always used makeup and worn jewelry, and always conducted ourselves in ways that are consistent with self-knowledge, selfimage, and gender identification – not just in our clothes but also in our hearts.

Other cultures and traditions, whether they be Native American, Asian or Greek – to name a few – have understood and affirmed this dimension of the heart of certain people and have historically made positive provision and purpose for it. Today, in our culture, this is by and large not true. Today, our "coming out" requires that we seek out and create that spiritual alliance for ourselves.

Coming out of the closet, that is, truly coming into our own, should be a transition in the most respected and honored of traditions – an occasion that is celebrated, not jeered, a stage of life that affirms reason, not a challenge to it. (cont page 2)

THE THOUGHTS OF MADAM LIBRARIAN Book Review by Victoria Lynn

VESTED INTERESTS Marjorie Garber Routledge, Chapman & Hall Inc.



That Marjorie Garber's new book 'Vested Interest' will have a major impact on how scholars view the issue of cross dressing and cross gender there can be no doubt. The trouble is that it has very little appeal for those who might need it most, namely the cross dresser!

'Interest' is the first book in a very long time to deal with the 'lifestyle' as just that, a lifestyle and still be published in the mainstream book industry. Unfortunately, the reader soon sees that while many other books of this sort might suffer from a lack of information, this one suffers from just the opposite. There is enough in here for a half dozen books. The author begins her work with the bold statement that; "There Can Be No Culture Without the Transvestite" and then proceeds to take nearly 400 pages to prove her point from every conceivable direction! The writing is very heavy going and it is easy to lose yourself. An example would be;

"The absolute insignia of maleness becomes the sin qua non of the male subjectivity of the transexual woman. To offer her a penis, in dead seriousness, becomes the ambivalent task of the specialist in gender dysphoria, the 'sex change' doctor..."

If it sounds like it was written by Freud or Jung in drag then you understand the problem. This by the way is a fairly mild example. What we have here is a book that bids fair to be the "War and Peace' of TV/TS scholarly literature.

If you are a professional in the gender field, or have a fairly advanced background in the literature of our lifestyle then you will be able to appreciate the extraordinary work that went into producing this book. If you're new to the scene or have a limited background, try something a little lighter first.

Worth the money but only if you have the where-with-all and back ground to get through it and having done so, get something useful from the effort.

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As you know from reading her book review in this issue in the column "Ihoughts Of Madam Librarian", our new contributor to the ACCORD Newsletter is Victoria Lynn.

Thus far, EON has been able too create and maintain itself through individual efforts, dues and fees, and financial contributions. financially, it has really been a matter of flying by the seats of our skirts. From the beginning of our facility construction to acquiring furnishings and accessories...from paying utilities bills and the monthly donation to Trinity Parish House to handling the costs for telephones, the newsletters and the meeting buffets...for all these costs we have had to rely largely on individual contributions to the group. Our annual dues and meeting fees have not been enough to sustain us.

Currently we are finishing all the accounting, budgetary, and legal work so that we may soon file for our federal 501(c) (3) tax exempt status. This includes a three year budget based on corporation goals, e\which in turn are based on providing services for crossdressers, transgenderists and transsexuals.

Clearly, we need to find ways to raise funds other than, or in addition to, our annual dues, meeting fees, and the generosity of a handful of individuals.

HERE'S LOOKING AT YOU, BABE HERE'S LOOKING AT YOU, BABE

Last month's article dealt with some of the instruments for makeup and application. I hope that you have taken the trouble to acquire some of the necessities that were mentioned.

I don't know how you feel about first encounters, but as a person who deals with people every day, I know how important it is to establish positive contact with everyone you meet throughout the day and this means eye contact.

Psychologically it is a fact that girls and boys talk differently when talking with another person of the same gender. Girls talking to each other, are open and interested in what the other person is saying, and establish eye contact with each other throughout the conversation. On the other hand, boys who talk together almost never establish direct eye contact during their conversations because they have never been gender trained over the scrimmage lines that, direct eye contact is established to assert power over the other person, such as in a stare-down situation between two defensive animals.

If you are observant, you will notice how two women in a room will look at each other when talking, and any two men talking will have one looking and talking and the other looking in another direction or at another object in the room and listening. For those of us who wish to emulate a more feminine nature, it is important to remember some of the more subtle qualities expressed by women.

The eyes are probably the most expressive and commanding part of our bodies and are a "reflection of the soul" so we will discuss how to make them the most attractive.

Basic eye makeup includes eyeshadows, eyebrow pencils, mascara, and an eyeliner pencil in liquid or pencil form. Other materials such as glitter or sparkles are for special uses or occasions.

Eveshadow colors are important and should be matched to compliment your natural skin tones and hair color, not necessarily by the color of your clothes. If you have fair skin and light hair to reddish hair, earthtone colors work well. Casual dressing calls for browns and pastels; special occasions can call for golds or greens. If you have auburn to black hair and a darker completion like a beige or olive, casual colors include dark browns and charcoals to violets and deep blues. Special occasions may require more vibrant colors like black, purples, and frosted colors. If you aren't sure of what works best for you, consult with someone who knows about skin tones and makeup or just practice with different colors until you have come up with a combination that you feel makes you look most attractive. Remember, we are trying to accomplish three things in two different looks. This may sound confusing, but if the same steps are followed in coloring the eyes, only the colors themselves change, making it alot simpler.

In almost all cases, eyebrow colors should be about the same color as your natural hair or a very close shade on the darker side of natural.

Eyeliner should be black or brown, but maybe deep blues or greens and purples for fancy affairs and pastel colors for casual times.

Mascara, which is applied to the eyelashes should be black or brown, but again, can be clear for daytime or casual use. Other colors such as blue and green are available but are more useful in creating a dramatic look.

Next month we will elaborate on the application of each of the above items so you will be able to have "the look" with beautiful eyes.

Other than a few glances from some of the other patrons, we had our lunch and got back on the road. We had deadline, for Angela had made an appointment at 4:00 to have her hair styled. We thought it best if we delayed our motel checkin and went directly to Waltham. The hair salon was downstairs from the IFGE offices, so being a few minutes early for the appointment, we went upstairs to visit with Merissa Lynn who was still at work late on a Saturday afternoon. She shared with us the organization's current agenda and the importance of the planned activity of the Congress of Delegates. She also relayed how they were using professional conventions to set up an educational exhibit booth to expose doctors and therapists to the gender community. This is one dedicated lady. Charliss took the opportunity to bring Merissa up to date on the progress EON is making in the Syracuse area.

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Angela's hair appointment did not happen because of a missed communication on their part so we had time to visit Vernon's. We shopped until 5:00 when they closed and set out to find the Comfort Inn in Delham. We took the scenic tour so a 20 minute ride turned into about 45 minutes, but we made it. By this time we had put in a full day and I had a 12 hour 5 o'clock shadow. But the reason for the trip was still ahead and we could not tire out. Angela went to her room to get ready and Charliss and I went to find the banquet room where the function was to be held. The organizer of the event, Erica, was eating with three other members in the dining room, so we visited for a few minutes. We then sat down in the lounge for a bit of refreshment. This was the first of many encounters with a wedding party that was sharing the motel facilities with our group. They looked, but did not touch.

It was getting late so Charliss and I returned to our room to change our clothes and replace our makeup. The process took longer than we thought but around 9 o'clock we went downstairs to find the party. Walking through the restaurant we were greeted by our very own reception line. A group of guys from the wedding party were standing at the top of the stairs that lead to our banquet room. I think they were amazed not only by how many of us there were but also how great we looked. We smiled as we passed. They laughed and said something we could not hear. it actually was a pleasant exchange, it seems there's strength in numbers.

As we entered the party, I had a great feeling. We had spent all day just to be here and seeing 70 or more crossdressers assembled in one room, made it all worth it. This group was a tremendous cross section of our community. There were young CDs and old CDs, there were pre-ops, wives, vendors who supply us, and best of all: WE WERE THERE. As we walked around saying hello, I felt welcomed, a feeling that comes with a shared interest. There were hot and cold hors d'oeuvres and a cash bar setup. We had a little to eat, a few drinks and just enjoyed being there. There was a DJ that was playing good music to dance to, so Angela and I spent some time on the dance floor. As the night progressed, we were able to meet or renew friendships with at least half of our sisters. Everyone in the room had a story and it was fun learning about each one of them.

We decided to go upstairs to the lounge to have a drink since it seemed may of our group was moving in that direction. We again encountered the wedding party. Some of them could not stop looking but again we outnumbered them so nothing was said. That's when i noticed 2 young ladies who kept smiling at us. I smiled back and waved. They laughed a little so I thought it best to find out if they had any questions. Angela and I did some outreach work for the next hour or two. They were very inquisitive about our life style for they had never had contact with any crossdressers. These girls were great. We knew we made a positive impression on them and hopefully promoted a better understanding of our activity. It was very important for me to demonstrate to these girls that we were not freaks or perverts. It was very gratifying knowing we accomplished this.

The lounge had to close but our group wasn't finished with the night. About 25 of us went upstairs to one of the rooms to have a nightcap. We invited the 2 girls from the bar to join us because they still were asking questions. We sat on the bed, some sat on the sink vanity, 2 lucky ones had the only chairs, but we continued to have fun sharing our experiences. THE GENDER COMMUNITY: WHERE ARE WE GOING IN THE NINETIES? A SOCIAL AND POLITICAL DISCUSSION

"... The time to make known our existence as a community is now. The time to state who we are is now. The time to state our goals as a group is now. This time is now because gender issues are being catapulted in the limelight of public recognition. This has given us an opportunity which we can not lose.

... Back in 1846, Henry David Thoreau said Beware of all enterprises that require new clothes.' but that same year on her return from a shopping spree, Mrs. Thoreau modified that by saying 'Beware of enterprises that require a matching handbag and accessories' (I'm kidding). 144 years later, IFGE is saying 'Beware of enterprises that <u>discriminate</u> about clothes.

... In the 90's we might find ourselves politically where the gay movement was 20 or 30 years ago in terms of finding an identity and embracing a sense of pride... Realize that our femininity is not based on a whim or passing fancy, but it is a core part of our identity.

Don't let others complicate your life by making you feel guilty about this. Rather than find yourself alone, develop a sense of pride in who you are as an individual and who we are as a community.

As enlightened, expansive thinkers, find new and creative ways to undo 10,000 years of male dominated history and being a softened, nurturing sense of femininity to life and to the world. When you reach that state of grace with yourself, you find peace. You realize that passing is not as important as simply being. You realize a sense of confidence coming out of this feeling of self-worth. You then exchange the verbs "passing" for simply "being".

And, if you've bought any of her handcrafted sterling jeweiry, or even just seen it on display during some of our meetings, you will know something of her aesthetics, and that many of her creations include the form of the EON logo.

Thanks to Cheryl (you're right, she donated the window) each and every one of us will soon be able

to enjoy this creation, this piece of jewelry that looks out to above our space at EON.

Thank you, Cheryl. And Angela, and Timothy. And thank you everyone, for what you are and what you do, and what you all hope for – for yourselves and others – is the very inspiration for anything that ever happens within the space of our life at EON.
