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HANDS OFF WASHINGTON KICKS OFF 1995 ANTI-HATE CAMPAIGN

The energy level in the Grand Ballroom of the Westin Hotel in downtown Seattle was electric, as nearly 1,000 people gathered to send the message to hate mongers that Washington is no place for religious bigotry. March 14, 1995, at an early morning breakfast meeting, people from all walks of life, all sexual orientations, all genders and socio-economic levels came together to kick off the second in a series of campaigns against homophobia and hatred. Various organizations purchased tables and for the first time, Ingersoll Center was represented and mentioned by name from the dais as being a supporter of Hands Off Washington.

The ballroom was beautifully decorated in the patriotic colors of red, white and blue. On huge television screens, videos declaring support for Lesbian, Transsexual, Gay, Transgender, Bisexual, and Transvestite people played continuously as people greeted one another and took their places.

During the breakfast, a talented, Seattle-based, multi-cultural singing group entertained with wonderfully inspiring music. After the breakfast, Peg Phillips, star of Northern Exposure spoke about her years of work in Civil Rights. After her stirring speech, Richard Vreeke, associate producer of Northern Exposure presented an affirming, narrated video presentation after which he introduced his partner.

Next to speak was Colonel Greta Kammermier, who received a standing ovation from the audience. She gave a short, but wonderful speech about what she has been through and urged all of us to keep up the fight against those who would deny anyone their civil and human rights.

Perhaps the most touching and moving speaker was Councilman Ron Sims who was, by his own definition, "The one to get you to open your pockets and check books!" His recounting of his experiences as an election monitor in Africa was both stunning and poignant. He told the audience that in Africa, he saw people who had few or no civil rights, and that such a thing must not happen in America, or in the State of Washington.

At the conclusion of his speech, a group of teenagers passed through the room with collection baskets. During this time, there were many checks written for \$25, \$50, \$100, \$500 and \$1,000, but the highlight was a check presented to Hands Off Washington for \$50,000!

People who attended agreed that they would rather be spending their time and money on other causes, but that as long as the religious extremists are at work, Hands Off Washington had plenty of work to do, and would keep on doing it!

CRITICISM: ONE WAY TO HANDLE IT

The group decided that criticism is a form of taking on power, and if you respond to criticism, you lose power over a situation. When a person reacts to the negative comment, they are giving up their power in a situation, and giving the other person satisfaction that they "Got to you". Also, not reacting to that "all to subtle" comment gives absolutely no credit to that comment.

There is positive and constructive criticism, but that is not what we were wrestling with in this session. We generalized in closing by saying that not showing the effect of negative criticism on yourself you are actually taking power away from the person criticizing. Correct or not in our theory, we sure helped answer some questions a lot of us had about handling criticism in the workplace, in public, and in general

The Gook's Gorner

I was raised on southern food: Foods fried and smothered in gravy, surrounded by several starches and followed by luscious desserts. To this day, fried chicken, milk gravy, home made biscuits, hot from the oven, and field peas seasoned with bacon is one of my favorite meals. But instead of eating it once a week, as we did growing up, I now make it once a year when the clan gathers.

Food is more than nourishment. It is delightful tastes, new experiences, comfort when you are sick or blue, a palette of textures and colors to treat the eye and a reservoir that conjures up memories of good times. Cooking is a creative outlet that brings immediate gratification. It is the same the world over, it joins food, friends and conversation. When I left home, I discovered there was a whole universe of food beyond my southern roots. It has been an adventure learning about them. Each culture has its own unique flavors. What at first seems foreign can quickly become a standard.

Anyone can cook great meals. Even if things don't turn out exactly as you planned, most mistakes are still edible. This month's recipe is homemade chicken soup, followed by a variation.

CHICKEN SOUP

BROTH

5 lbs chicken backs and necks or 1 whole stewing chicken large onion peeled and studded with 4 whole cloves

2 whole peeled carrots

I celery stalk

bay leaf
tsp minced garlic or more, to taste (optional)
coarse ground black pepper to taste.

salt to taste (hint: don't add salt until the soup is done)

Make the broth the day before you want to serve it. Ask the butcher at any grocery store for the packages of backs and necks

Place the chicken and the other ingredients (except for the salt) in a large pot with a tight lid. Just cover the ingredients with cold water and bring the mixture to a boil. Lower the heat and cover the pot. Simmer the broth for 2 1/2 to 3 hours. Allow to cool, then strain the broth into a clean container. Taste and add salt and adjust other seasonings to taste. Place the container in the refrigerator over night. By morning the fat will have congealed on the surface. Skim the fat with a large sppon and discard it. You now have rich, fat free chicken broth. Serve the broth over cooked noodles or rice.

ITALIAN CHICKEN SOUP

18 oz. package cheese tortellini or ravioli cooked according to package directions.

3 cups of the chicken broth

1 beaten egg

bunch of fresh spinach, cleaned and stems trimmed or 1 box of frozen spinach

clove garlic minced (optional)
 grated parmesan or romano cheese

Heat the broth with the garlie. When it begins to boil, reduce the heat to simmer and whisk in the egg. Continue to whisk until egg is in strands. Add the spinach and pasta. Cook just long enough for the spinach to turn bright green. Taste the broth and adjust the seasonings. Ladle into serving bowls and sprinkle with cheese. Serves 4. Serve with crusty bread and salad.

Robert Ingersoll:

A Voice in the Wilderness, Then and Now

Listed below are some quotes by Robert Green Ingersoil, the advocate for the forces of Justice and prosecutor of the status quo, who lived in the 19th century. Like Ingersoil Center which bears his name, Ingersoil brought a strong voice and hope to those who suffered the injustices of an Intolerant world. Although he died in 1899, at the age of 66, his words have been renewed over and over again in this century, and especially now as we face the hatred and bigotry prevalent in our society. Ingersoil said:

"The moment a prejudice is known to be a prejudice, it disappears. Ignorance is the soil in which prejudice must grow. Touched by a ray of light, it dies."

He also said:

"I have a dream....that the withered hand of want will not always be stretched out for charity; that finally wisdom will sit in the legislatures, justic in the courts, charity will occupy all the pulpits, and that finally the world will be governed by justice and charity and by the splendid light of liberty."

in 1882, Ingersoll, in a speech on Decoration Day preceded John F. Kennedy's exhortation at his inaugural by declaring:

"Mere politicians wish the county to do something for them. True patriots desire to something for their country."

Finally, Ingersoll stated in his "Creed":

Justice is the only worship.
Love is the only pitest.
Ignorance is the only stavery.
Happiness is the only good.
The time to be happy is now,
The place to be happy is here,
The way to be happy is to make others so.

Founder continued future legislation This is a dramatic change in previous attitudes and I applaud Hands Off Washington for their willingness to implement these decisions.
