A FIRST TIMER'S VIEWS

The following is a letter from Marsha descibing her first night out with our group. Marsha has since joined our group and is quite active. Marsha has been a regular participant in our rap group sessions, our parties and our mate support group.

My first time out in public was also my first time at the Club 145. I went there with a great deal of hope and fear. When I left home that evening I could not explain my feelings to my wife. She accompanied me that night and is very supportive of me. I am writing this not only to all of you but to her as well. It might just begin to unravel some of the feelings that I had that evening.

It all started when my wife told me that she had written to TGIC for information about the group. She did this without asking or telling me what she had done. That actually made me quite happy. I then recieved a letter from Dawn followed by a phone call shortly thereafter. After talking to Dawn I was surprised to find out how relaxed I was talking about my crossdressing. I had never been able to talk to anyone except my wife about it before. After the call I was looking forward to the Saturday night party. This would be my first opportunity to actually meet another crossdresser face to face. I must admit that it was very comforting to have the support of my wife at this time and her company on the upcoming Saturday evening.

All the rest of that week and including Saturday I couldn't believe how calm I felt. That is not like me at all. Sure I was extremely excited but it was also very reassuring that I was now not "the only one". Even the problem of not being able to dress at home (my children do not know of my crossdressing) could not get me down. I just dressed on the way to the club. I even drove while dressed, another first for that evening. My only fear and biggest worry was having to walk into the club. I had pictured a large, crowded room, filled with alot of smoke and noisy people. What I found was just the opposite. The room was quiet with a handful of people there. I was also

not the only newcomer there that evening. The whole atmosphere was very relaxing and ready made for conversation. It made for a very comfortable and enjoyable evening. S

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After we left my wife asked if everything was allright with me. She said it looked as if something was bothering me. I was surprised because I had had a great time. After we talked it over we dicovered the reason for her concern. Since this was the first time out for me, I had found out that I was very self conscience. Iwas worried about how I looked, moved, and sat. I did not really notice what or who was around me. Even though I was very happy and satisfied on the inside my outside showed something else alltogether. That is a problem that I have always had. I have just started showing my emotions to others. Another thing was that I am not one to be able to mingle right off the bat. Once I get to know people I'm fine. If I may, I am asking all of you for your understanding as I may need your help in figuring all of this out. I am looking forward to becoming an active participant in our group.

It has taken me many years to finally go public and it feels wonderful. It really helps to know that I now have the support of a wonderful wife and of many others like myself. You can now see why that first Saturday night was "The First Day of The Rest of My Life". Marsha

WOMAN WANTS TO CHANGE SEX AGAIN

This was the headline in the Times Union, Albany's largest newspaper this past month. The Associated Press story follows.

SEDALIA, Mo.- A respected pediatrician is causing a stir with the disclosure of her sex-change surgery to become a woman 11 years ago, and her desire now to change back to a man.

"I was born male and I was raised male, and I feel like that's the way I'll feel most contented," said Dr. Janis Ashley, one of Sedalia's two practicing pediatricians.

Ashley, 38, has refused to talk to reporters after she disclosed in an interview published in the Sedalia Democrat that she was a man until her 1978 sex-change operation-and wanted to be a man once again.

The disclosures surprised Ashley's patients but many have rallied around her. But some residents of Sedalia, a town of 21,000 people in central Missouri, are making fun of the physician.

Ashley apologized to the town and said she wanted to continue her practise in Sedalia.

"This topic has the potential to be a flare point...I'm sorry for that and for giving this town or any part of the community any unwanted notoriety," she said.

Ashley has a 4-year old adopted son, Michael, and said he might be confused about her changing sexuality. She is taking male hormones and said she would not undergo reconstructive surgery right away.

"I tell Michael I am his mommy and I will always be his mommy, but I'm also his daddy," Ashley said. "I am his mother, his parent-whatever you call it-(but) that emotional attachment will be the same."

Ashley was married before deciding at age 25 to become a woman. The marriage ended in divorce.

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TV WIFE'S BILL OF RIGHTS

The following was taken from A Rose News and was done by Helen T. the wife of a tv. I enjoyed it and learned a few things from it. I hope it will benefit some of you also.

My husband is a transvestite. I love him enough to accept that portion of his personality with very few reservations. In many years of marriage, nothing in my husband's practice of crossdressing has undermined my love for him as a man, or my acceptance of this facet of his personality. However, from my experiences as the "TV Wife", and observations of other married TVs and their wives among our friends, I would like to pass on a few suggestions. These tips are based on more or less prevalent problems which can throw a marital relationship involving TVism off balance. Some of the points I will make are drawn from admittedly minor irritations or annoyances; others are pased on conflicts which can bear the seeds of destruction into a TV's marriage. I call these points; "The TV Wife's Bill of Rights".

1. DON"T CALL ME ROOMMATE! I have no wish to be your roommate, or your "Sister" or your "Girlfriend". I am your WIFE and I want to be treated as your wife, no matter how you may be dressed at any given time.

2. NEVER LET ME FORGET THAT YOU ARE MY HUSBAND! Nothing will make me Eeel more insecure in our marriage, and in my owm femininity, than for you to be carried away by some mystical "GIRL WITHIN" and forget you are a man and my husband.

3. DON'T COMPETE WITH ME! When we are out in public and you are "dressed", I do not mind that you have a good time with the femininity you've achieved, but I bitterly resent any competetive comparisons you might make between your femininity and my appearance. If others are so rude as to make comparisons, I want you to be on my side. 8

4. DON'T ABBREVIATE ME! I and other females are complete persons. Whoever thought up such abbreviations as RG (real girl) or GG (genetic girl) certainly must have a deep seated contempt for women. Unless you want to make me doubt my own femininity by your actions or attitude toward me, I need no abbreviated reminder that I am a real girl. How would you like it if I called you a RB (real boy) or GB (genetic boy)?

5. DON'T TELL ME TVism IS NORMAL! While I might on occasion, express misgivings about your dressing up as a woman, I threw the word "normal" out of my vocabulary years ago when I found out that it no longer had any real meaning in a world whereno two people are exactly alike. So, let's leave such words as "normal" and "abnormal" to the psychiatrists, the psychologists, and the social workers who spend their lives pigeon-holing human beings.

6. DON'T SPEAK TO ME ABOUT HORMONES! Whether you cite them as an excuse for your being a TV, or by talking wistfully of them as a means of making your anatomy "more feminine". I like your body the way it is and I don't want you to suddenly to start sprouting breasts. And, in case you have not kept up with the medical literature, estrogens can greatly reduce your sex drive which, thank God, still contributes to our marriage.

7. DON'T TELL THE CHILDREN YOU'RE THEIR AUNTIE! If they happen to see you "dressed", they know you pretty well and won't be the least bit fooled. Let me do any explaining which has to be done, if such a situation ever arises.

8. TRY LOUNGING AROUND THE HOUSE IN MALE CLOTHES! I don't mind you donning a pretty gown or negligee now and then, but a steady diet of it tends to get monotonous.

9. DON'T ALWAYS EXPECT ME TO HELP YOU DRESS! It takes me time to look my feminine best when we go out. I don't mind helping you with last minute touches, but I don't have the time to supervise every detail of your transformation.

10. LISTEN TO MY ADVICE! When I make suggestions on your make-up, hairdo, or deportment, I'm only trying to help. I want you to look your best, whether you're dressed as a woman or a man.

11. DON'T WEAR MY CLOTHES WITHOUT MY PERMISSION! You have your own feminine clothing, and when I'm planning on wearing an outfit of my own, I hate to find it stretched out of shape, or otherwise unwearable before it is laundered or dry cleaned.

12. PLAY FAIR WITH ME WHEN IT COMES TO OUR SOCIAL LIFE! I don't object to your TV friends or going to TV social occassions with you, but I expect you to accept my circle of friends and attend their parties with me without complaint.

13. STICK TO THE BUDGET! When you buy your feminine clothing or accessories, stick to your own budget just as you expect me to stick to mine. Let's talk it over before either of us buys something "extravagant".

14. PAY ATTENTION TO YOUR MALE CLOTHING! I am tired of picking up your suits, shirts, slacks, underwear, and socks from the corners where you dump them, and I wonder why you treat your feminine clothes so much better.

15. STOP MAKING EXCUSES FOR BEING A TV! If I can manage to live with your transvestism, you should be able to bear up under it quite well. You might be surprised to know that (from a wife's point of view) a lot worse monsters live in this world than TVs, and I'm glad you are not a drunkard, junkie, or compulsive gambler; any of these problems make you pale into insignificance by comparison. All I really ask of you is that you relax, be yourself, and BE IN LOVE WITH ME.

There were services for our community, publications, literature, shops, concerned proffessionals who are ready to help, and local support groups all over the world. We are definitely NOT alone.

Unfortunately, New York state has seen alot of turnover in these support groups in recent months. Gone or just barely hanging on are groups like EON in Syracuse, TVA in Rochester, and BUTTERFLY in Binghamton. This I find odd on one count but understandable on another level. Many times I have seen the lack of a definite leader, a person willing to take personal risks to head a club, foreshadow it's downfall.
