Tricks of the Trade to a Better Image, Kinetic Incongruities & "Getting Read"

The following is offered for those planning on spending any time in public as a female. It is based on advice from other T's, female friends, and my own observations.

Females have better posture and stand up straighter than males This is because they have breasts to support. Don't slouch!

Men tend to look away from each other when talking, or at the wall. Women look each other in the eyes when communicating.

Breast placement: Ideally, they should be 3 " below your armpits. The nipple should be even with the midpoint of the shoulder. When you use breast forms, place a shoulder pad underneath for support. And make sure they're not crooked.

Hips: To simulate a woman's "hourglass" figure, you have to simulate a higher waist. A wide belt helps the illusion. Also, pull blouse out a little over the belt to "billow" it.

Do you find pantyhose too hot and restricting especially when going to the bathroom? Consider thigh-highs with an elastic band. Many stores carry them.

Black stockings are better for a dressy outfit or evening wear. They don't necessarily work as well with casual dress.

Do you rip your nylons when putting them on, due to rough or broken nails? Some TV's use an old "test pair" to run nails over, before putting on the real pair.

Can't get dressed at home and have to do it somewhere else? Then invest in a full length garment bag: the kind you can put over an outfit and hang in the back seat of your car. Suitcases and roll bags are not good enough. They often leave outfits hopelessly wrinkled.

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REMEMBERING LENORE

A Tribute to a Special Friend!

Several weeks ago, our long time member Lenore, sat down to watch television and quietly passed away in her chair. She was 76 years old. Her survivors include three loving sons, four adoring grandchildren, and many nieces, nephews and good friends. - But that hardly tells the story!

For Those of you who didn't know, Lenore was an ordained Lutheran minister. Reverend Bob (as we shall. call him) was not just an ordinary church minister. He was a well known historian and theologian in his church community. He was an author and scholar who was sought after as a speaker and preacher at church functions. In addition, he frequently appeared on Sunday mornings television worship programs.

Rev. Bob graduated from a major university and its seminary. His first assignment was as minister of a church in Iowa. He then moved to a large downstate church and was the Chaplain for one of the largest hospitals in Southern Illinois. This led him to become the Chaplain for one of Chicago's largest hospitals. More recently he was the Chairman of the Chicago Chaplain Corps., an organization of chaplains of all religious persuasions for all of Chicago area hospitals.

Lenore first came in contact with Chi Chapter/Tri Ess when she called the chapter hot line back in 1985 or 1986. This was the beginning of a long and close relationship between Lenore, Naomi, Barbara Lee, Eve and a few others who knew of her status. She became a regular at Chi Chapter meetings, dinners and events always looking her best. She loved going out shopping and for dinner with her Chi Chapter friends.

Lenore and Naomi became good friends. They had dinner together quite often. Even though Lenore preferred to keep her status discreet, she also looked forward to going with Naomi to make class visits at the College of Dupage and at Manchester College in Indiana. At these events she would describe herself as being a 'marriage and family counselor'' which she was, indeed.

Lenore had a wonderful sense of humor. Naomi tells the following story: "Lenore and I always looked forward to our dinners together. They became interesting discussions on a wide variety of topics from current events to religion to crossdressing. Lenore had studied comparative religion and knew more about my Judaism than I did about being a Lutheran, even though we came from entirely different backgrounds; we almost always agreed on moral guidelines, prohibitions and pronouncements. We also frequently discussed the Biblical pronouncement of Deuteronomy. Our talks also included more mundane things One dinner a few years ago Lenore disclosed that she had received a letter from the III. Sec. of State and that because other age she had to take the drivers test as part of her drivers license renewal. At the same time I told Lenore that I had received my license renewal and I had to take the eye exam. Several weeks later, at dinner, I asked Lenore how the drivers test turned out. Lenore told me she had done something she wasn't proud of, she had worn her minister's collar when she took the drivers exam when I asked bow she did she said she had passed with flying colors-no problem! Lenore then asked me how I had done at my renewal and I told her I hadn't gone yet She then responded: "Would you like to borrow the collar?"

Though we are all saddened by Lenore's passing we can rejoice in the life she led. She was a good person. A person of courage and strength in chasing her dream. We have lost a good brother, a dear sister and a wonderful friend. We will miss you!

The Queen of Hearts Pageant and the panel discussion brought individuals' feelings, personal views and opinions to the chapter as a whole. And dialogs - happened.

More of this type of open, directed dialogs is, in my opinion, building self-awareness and inclusiveness. And helps us to realize we are all similar under that stiff masculine veneer.

The panel answering questions; posed different feelings and opinions, without ridicule from anyone. I believe the health of any group is measured by the active participation by its' members in open dialogs. And that means, for everyone to hear and be heard.

For the shy and the new comer, just listening may be sufficient. Fertile images and thoughts, not otherwise brought from the depths of ones being, may not have been brought to one's conscious thought. It is the self reflective thoughts, spoken and exchanged in an open meeting that brings out our true feminine self.

The feminine self is more than clothes, wigs, lipstick, high heels and nail polish. It is building relationships. Again - IT IS BUILDING RELATIONSHIPS! It is nurturing.

It is guiding and encouraging others to be all they can be.

I realize some may have difficulty reconciling their feminine with their masculine. It takes help from others. It takes self courage to "be real". For many of us, our feminine self is in it's infancy. The male (testosterone)reigns.

In my opinion, there are some in Chi Chapter, who are really interested in integrating the masculine and the feminine. For example - total "control" (male) for "natural consequences" (female); harsh and heavy handed (male) and nurturing (female); boisterous loud and demonstrative (male) to subliminal, quiet, and gentile (female).

Chi Chapter, the support group, encourages change and loving relationships. Many of our members are changing, becoming whole; integrating and becoming family centered. The cross dresser is not the only one who benefits. The cross dressers' whole family benefits.

And believe it or not, Chi Chapter is a family based organization.

The best way to get "read" at a lesbian bar is to wear a dress. Lesbians dress casual, even slightly masculine: say, jeans and a top. If you try to look too feminine, you'll be out of place. Think hutch!!!

Be careful going out alone. It has never been safe for females, and crossdressers have to live with this. Horror stories abound of TV's being beaten and raped.

Wonderful as it is to meet another sister, please be careful about indiscriminately giving out your male name and phone number.

Call it "Gender Kinetics." It's about how women touch each other. How close they stand in relation to other women and men. How they smile and laugh. How they hold things. How they eat or sit. Passing isn't just about objective things like beard cover and breasts. It's also about subjective things like motion. The best made-up TV can give the game away with inappropriate movements.

Noon, downtown San Diego, near 5th and C St, where there's lots of pedestrian traffic. She had wavy blonde hair, a black long sleeved sweater top, a 16" clinging flowered skirt, opaque black hose. Miniskirts draw attention, no matter who's wearing them. Now dial my interest was piqued, I noticed there was something different about her. Then it dawned on me: "She was a guy!"

At first, I could not define what led me to this. She gave off a certain indescribable "radiation of incongruity."Then, I realized: her movements. She had a tense, clipped stride, the way men walk. There was none of the comfortable, loose, fluid motions that women have. Now, being crossdressed in public is nervewracking. I know, but that nervousness transmits itself to body language, and this uneasiness is transmitted to the casual observer subconsciously, if not consciously.

Now that I was examining her closely, I saw her lack of hips, and broad shoulders, which clinched it Let me say that she was not necessarily an obvious read, however, she gave off certain kinetic inconsistencies.

As genetic and social males. we tend to look at the material things, while woman look at the more spiritual and intangible ones. This attitude carries over into our crossdressing. We focus on type of beard cover/electrolysis, size of breasts, hormones, length of skirt, and height of heels. But little attention is paid to the ethereal aspects of femininity, such as body language.

You can't "assemble" a female image, the way some male engineers would have it. You have to create it in a truly female way. Woman is as woman does.
