It is with a great deal of pride that I accept the position of Managing Director of the Renaissance Education Association for the coming year. The pride I feel is in the organization, the people of that organization, and in my good fortune to be part of Renaissance from its beginning.

Since that beginning, our goal has been to be innovative, pro-active, and helpful to the transgender community and to provide education to the rest of society.

We have now become a large, multifaceted organization. By the end of 1989 we counted over 300 paid members in 30 states and Canada. We ship over 550 copies of the *Renaissance News* to ten countries around the world.

Our commitment to the commu-

nity has been reflected in a number of programs in the past, some within Renaissance and some in cooperation with other organizations.

While we will continue to seek innovative solutions to problems encountered by members of the transgendered community, two constants must remain: service and communication.

Managers need androgynous traits

Question: Are masculine or feminine traits required for a person to succeed in a managerial position?

Answer: Both.

A major study of 455 employees showed that managers who are perceived by subordinates to be effective have androgynous characteristics—a blend of male and female qualities.

In fact, they have a high level of both masculine and feminine skills. Conversely, strongly sex-typed managers seem to have limited success as managers.

Some implications:

 Findings show that employees are more satisfied with androgynous managers—and that increasing the number of these managers may decrease employee turnover.

- Companies can predict how satisfied employees will be with a prospective manager by determining the androgynous qualities of the person they plan to hire.
- Companies should consider offering training in androgynous management skills.

Feminine qualities range from a sensitivity to employee needs to alliance building. Masculine qualities cover such things as dominance and possessing a willingness to take risks.

That First Job

One of the hardest mountains for a transsexual in transition to climb is the job market. Some people transition on the job with the aid of an understanding employer, and bypass this hurdle. But the numbers of these lucky people are few. The majority of transsexuals must leave their present job, or career, and are forced to seek gainful employment elsewhere. The British call this situation a "sticky wicket."

After spending several years in a career field or with a certain employer nearly everyone forgets what job hunting is like. If you thought that position you landed in 1973 was hard to come by, baby, you ain't seen nothin' yet! The 1990's are destined to see a major correction in the stock market followed by a devastating recession. Every recession spawns mass unemployment as thousands of companies go belly up. Then, of course, there is the ripple effect throughout the economy as unemployment rises, buying of consumer goods slows, lesser firms fire or lay off still more people due to their decreased sales.

Today, as some of you probably have already discovered, there are hundreds if not thousands of people vying for a single position. Where I live in Colorado we have Coors Brewery which takes in over 45,000 applications every year for approximately 400 openings. Another brewery, Anheuser Busch, recently opened a plant just a few miles from my home. Before they began production in 1988 over 21,000 applications were received from people in 14 states seeking the 200 new jobs. That's what the competition is like out there folks. Trench warfare of World War I was easy compared to job hunting today. So how do transsexuals with two strikes against them find meaningful work that pays the bills?

Let's assume the scenario that

you must change careers altogether. Let's also say that you really don't want to use your old employer as a reference for fear that he may spill the beans' about your gender status. Your best bet is to start with the Want Ads in the local paper. They are filled with hundreds of openings that will draw much competition. Each city has a different makeup so the jobs will vary from place to place. Scan the ads with a critical eye. You may notice a number of openings in two or three major job fields.

The medical profession is always short of help. You'll typically find positions for nursing assistants, and medical assistants. Security work is usually plentiful in most areas, and easy to get. Plus, you will also see many positions for administrative assistants (secretaries to you and me). Markets like these that advertise continually see a large turnover in personnel making the chance of getting a job much better.

They may not, however, pay much. Most shell out minimum wage, some slightly more. You have to understand that you're starting at the bottom, again. Never mind what you had been making before your transition. If it was a lot of money that will work against you. Starting from ground zero is difficultyet many people do it every day. A minimum wage job will initiate the track record to better positions down the road...but you gotta start somewhere

Being a nursing assistant in a nursing home is not the most glamorous job in the world but it's tremendously rewarding if you like helping others. Many nursing homes offer free certification courses for all who apply, and certified nurses aides make more than non-certified people. They're also in great demand.

Being a secretary may require some particular skills, like typing 50 words per minute, or operating a certain type of computer system. If you were business oriented before, this may be the best field for you.

Security work really has few requirements albeit a smattering knowledge of the law would be helpful, and it is open to veterans.

Armed with a few ideas the only thing you have to do now is apply. Yes, they ask for references. What? You say you don t have any? Here's a situation that can be handled with grace if you approach it right. Before you make your gender move, it might be wise to start doing volunteer work for a local organization, maybe a museum. Networking in organizations like this will provide a valuable wealth of contactspeople who are willing to act as a reference. It is also good if your volunteer work entails handling money, working with customers, or supervising a project to completion. Volunteer work will give you back as much as you give of your time.

After getting that first job you are on your way to establishing an employment track record. Later, you can move on to bigger and better positions. Of course, the more positions you have worked at the more references you also have. But don t make it too many. A prospective employer may detect a record of job hopping, which may prove detrimental if they are looking for someone to fill a permanent spot.

Switching jobs can be scarier than switching sexes. But if you set up preplanning, volunteer time, network, and choose a job field with high turnover, you stand a very good chance of succeeding. Do it with a purpose, have a good, positive attitude, and remember to smile when you walk in the door for that first job interview. You know you'll get it because now you've done everything right!

Often, it will have personal observations and opinions. May it give you pause to think and respond.

The Big Easy

Some recent discussions on several computer bulletin boards have been concerned with hopelessness and the thoughts of suicide that many transgendered people experience. To understand myself, I have been examining my own feelings and their circumstances. You may find a thread of recognition.

One of the apparent contradictions for transgendered people is that thoughts of suicide as an alternative choice are many times something of a recent memory — not something that has been a fact of life since our earliest years. Why? Why now? Why, if our gender conflict was indeed so intense and so

sincere, have we not considered suicide a long time ago? The answer lies in the following:

There was no hopelessness because previously there was no hope.

This may seem very strange, but consider this. For many years I did not understand what was happening to me. There was no self-knowledge. There were no labels, no alternatives. I only knew that things were wrong; that I was out of place. There were no overt thoughts of suicide, only a gnawing at the soul. Self-destruction was subconscious. Some of us become alcoholic, some anorexic, some seek abusive relationships. I became a work-aholic, burying myself at the office to avoid conflicts at home. Eventually, I learned more about myself and about others. I learned that there were alternatives for life, for coping, for functioning. Thus came hope there was a solution for me to find.

Political revolutions occur when rising expectations are unfulfilled.

Similarly, suicide is contemplated when hope becomes trampled into hopelessness and despair. When other alternatives are pushed farther and farther away, so far that we perceive them as unreachable, that is when hope gives way to despair and to thoughts of suicide.

As long as we understand this, as long as we can have, or believe, that we can find a Plan B or a Plan C, then hope remains. It is not squashed. It will "spring eternal." By understanding this the temptation of that ultimate denial becomes weaker, and its beckoning call less frequent.

Transgendered people must put up with all sorts of bureaucratic b.s. This is especially true for those who are in prison. So it comes as no surprise that Nebraska prison officials denied an inmate's request to receive female hormones in preparation for a possible sex change. But it appears that in this case the denial may have been warranted.

The inmate said he wants to become a woman to control his sexual attraction to young girls. Officials replied that his problems resulted from "psychotic features of paranoia" that a sex change would not cure.



Not all government officials have such an understanding of transsexualism. For example, transsexuals have legal rights in only a handful of European countries. This issues was one of the topics discussed at a recent meeting in Rome of the Italian Transsexual Movement. The oppression of transsexuals in Argentina was also discussed. Several politicians, including Communist members of the Italian Parliament, attended many of the workshops. Some say the Communist Party was responsible for the legal recognition of transsexuals in Italy.

Colin Firth, the handsome, young British actor who played one of the gay spies in *Another Country* and the French cad in *Valmont*, seemingly can't wait to follow in Divine's footsteps. Of his penchant for odd roles, Firth recently told an interviewer, "I wouldn't mind playing a woman for a change, or a man who dresses like a woman to commit crimes. That would be exciting!"



We have just the role for Firth, the "female" lead in *M. Butterfly*, the Tony-award winning play about the transvestite star of the Peking Opera who becomes the lover of a naive French diplomat. The only problem is that the play closed in January after more than two years, and there is no talk yet of a film version.



"Theatre people" aren't the only ones who do drag for money. We are thinking, of course, of those whose commerce is on the public thoroughfares of our cities. Police in San Diego recently rounded up a large number of these workers in the downtown area and near the U.S. Naval Station. A large number of transvestites and transsexuals were arrested even though the sweep was intended to rid the streets of female prostitutes.

"Most of the time, you can't tell the difference," said Lt. Leslie Lord, who is in charge of the vice squad. "They look awful good." What's more, he said, "at least 95 percent of the young men who do business with transvestites have absolutely no idea with whom they're dealing."

Police, however, know who they are dealing with, but don't know what to do with them after they are arrested. The girls are too much like men to go in the women's jail, and too much like women for the men's jail. Many are illegal aliens from Mexico, and they are quickly turned over to the Immigration and Naturalization Service.



Perhaps it was this problem of providing appropriate housing that prompted the deputy director of

Feminity-1, Masculinity-0...JoAnn Roberts

I was watching a most fascinating show on public television the other evening, A Gathering of Men. Bill Moyers was talking with Nobel laureate and poet Robert Bly. The subject was men and their feelings.

Bly has been traveling the country conducting "masculinity" workshops for men. In these workshops, he helps men come to grips with their inner feelings, particularly about their fathers, through lecture and poetry.

"Women," says Bly, "have learned to deal with pain. Like the pain of being a 'devalued' person, as women have been in our culture for over 2000 years. But men don't learn to deal with pain. Men don't show emotion."

One comment really caught at me. Bly said that around age 30-35 men learn that all the "macho" images they cherished in their youth are unrealistic. It is a crushing blow to lose your heroes.

This struck me because so many transvestites knock down the closet door during that same time period. Do we recognize the truth of Bly's words and in response decide to create "heroines" for ourselves?

For transvestites, what often follows the exit from the closet is a period of unbridled fantasy; dress, dress, dress, every spare moment. There is a period of rejection of all things masculine. The ultimate goal is to go "full time." In the process they abandon part of their masculinity. For many it is only begrudgingly restored for work. For some it's never recovered.

It is a shame, really, to deny part of what we are. We should try to find the balance point between masculine and feminine. We should integrate the best qualities of both into the person we are everyday of our lives. The old Chinese philosophers knew the truth: There can be no Yin without a Yang.

Inga, a colorful drag queen in the City by the Bay, has threatened to do just that if she is forced to return to her native Great Britain. She came to San Francisco just over two years ago, and on Halloween of 1987 she discovered drag. She soon found a following and even became a member of the Imperial Court, but that popularity may have been her downfall; someone snitched to the

Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) that she had overstayed her tourist visa. When threatened with deportation to England, Inga hatched the plan for sanctuary with the Sisters of Perpetual Indulgence at Grace Cathedral.

"I saw this political person from Panama seek sanctuary," she said of Gen. Manuel Noriega. "I thought, well, that seems pretty easy because I'm not a drug lord or anything. I'm just a simple drag queen trying to earn a living."

Was she prepared for the possibility that INS agents would surround the cathedral and blast it with rock music? "I would really suffer with Eydie Gorme," she said. "But it could be worse; it could be Patsy Cline."

Inga's deportation was being appealed, but she was not hopeful she would be allowed to stay. She said she will miss San Francisco. "I'm 33 now and it took me 30 long years to realize where I should be."

Doing drag in public often leads to all kinds of problems. But sometimes, it isn't the crossdresser who is the victim. In January, a gay man from Maryland was fatally shot outside a Washington, D.C. gay bar as he tried to protect a man in drag from being sexually assaulted by three youths.

The youths accosted the drag queen as he was leaving the Brass Rail, and demanded that she perform oral sex on them. Hearing to commotion outside, Michael Warren left the bar to help her. The youths taunted Warren for sticking up for the drag queen, and challenged him to a fight. As Warren stepped forward with his fists raised, one of the youths pulled out a concealed gun and shot Warren in the chest. The assailant then stepped up to Warren, slumped on the sidewalk, and put another bullet into his chest. He died 45 minutes later.

Doing drag in private is no picnic either. Just ask Walter Knierieman, 29, of Columbia, S.C. He used to break into houses and dress up in the women's clothes he found there.

Knierieman's escapades came to an end recently when Dennis Daye returned home and found Knierieman walking about the house dressed only in a pair of Mrs. Daye's panties and long evening gloves. Daye apprehended Knierieman and held him until police arrived and charged him with a second degree burglary.

Knierieman could claim a defense of being under the influence of drugs. But that wouldn't work for two Midwestern female impersonators who got in trouble with the law for drugrelated offenses.

According to a dishy, but generally reliable source, a former Miss Ohio Valley U.S.A. is serving a year in prison for selling cocaine to an undercover policeman in Cincinnati.

Meanwhile, in full drag, another female impersonator was stopped by police for a routine traffic check. The girl acted nervous, the officer became suspicious, and he searched her purse, finding a small amount of marijuana. She has already prepared for her court appearance by cutting her flowing tresses and buying a new set of men's clothes.

Maybe it was drugs. How else could you explain the behavior at the Miss Memphis pageant for female impersonators held at a club called Reflections?
