# TRANSVESTISM VS HOMOSEXUALITY:

THE proper s exual role of the transvestite is a question that has generated much confusion in recent years. Typical off the confusion is an article by Dr. L.F.Mooney, formerly of Havard, who maintains, that there is no such thing as transvestitism or homosexuality, that these habits are defined entirely by the attitude of society and ends with the question, "Is society perfect?"

Dr. Mooney and others have only served to muddy the waters that these ques-tions have churned up. The only way to get a clear picture of the phenomenon of transvestitism is through a satistical approach.

In other words, if a controlled study finds that a sizable majority of transvestities are homosexuals, then one must conclude that these perversions go hand in hand.

If, contrariwise, such a study produced the conclusion that transvestitism is no obstacle to otherwise normal, heterosexual practices, then one would have to reject any connection between this practice and homosexuality. Unfortunately, no such study has been made, nor is it likely that one can be effectively accomplished in the foreseeable future. The reason for this is that

the vast majority of transvestities do not advertise their practice or making

themrxelves readily available to the questions of statisticians & sex-researcher Once out of the closet, where we can count them, they can be statistically evaluated, and there will be no necessity for idle chatter about "historical per-spectives" and vague theories about the connection between female impersonation and homosexuality.

Limited surveys have produced, inconclusive results. The transvestite scene is equally divided among those who profess straight-arrow heterosexuality, those

who declare it to be purely a homosexual practice, These results are inconclusive, because of the limited number of persona who could be surveyed. I believe that those who permitted themselves to be questiona considering the current temper of society, include a large number of personalities who might be classed as unstable by many standards. If transvestitism were a common practice, such people would have to find another sympton with which to exhibit their neurotic impulses.

I am not implying that transvestities are neurotic; only those willing to submit to a sexual questionnaire are.

I do not believe that transvestitism has anything to do with sex. The propor tion of homosexuals and heterosexuals in the transvestite population is the same as the proportion of such people in the non-transvestite population.

The mainspring of transvestitism is not sexual gratification, but ego-grati-fication. In our society, pretty girls attract attention. This is a truism readly verifiable on any street corner, in any page of advertising, in any book or magazine cover. Girls dress to enhance their attention-getting potential,

with brightly colored clothes, striking make-up, laces and frills and bows. Therefore, if a person craves attention, what better way to attract it than by becoming--or appearing to become--a pretty girl? It is not a need of the libido, but of the ego, that is satisfied by this practice. As our society grows in population and by necessity, grows in regimentation and depersonalization of the individual, it is only natural that more and more men straved for attention will seek this method of feeding their egos.

Ones hears and reads so much about transvestitism and transsexualism nowadays that one might think they were a new fad--a part of the sexual revolution and the "now" generation. But these practices have been around for a long time. Stories of men masquerading in women's clothing, are as old as the records of civilization.

It wasn't untill the beginning of modern psychology-which traces its roots to the later part of the 19th century-that a more scientific and objective apprasial of this aberration appeared in medical and sexological journals.

The aberration of transvestitism invloves impersonation, or concealing true sexual identity by assuming the dress and makeup of the opposite sex. Not many men today would wear laces or frills on their clothes-but since clothing has always been a matter of personal taste, as well as prevailing custom, it would be improper to accuse a man of being a transvestite soley on the evidence that his clothing does not conform to the current trends of male attime. Simple colors and plain styles of clothing suit the average man in today's

society. More often it is the female who is usually in competition with other

members of her sex in the matter of attire. But since, looking at it objectively, female clothing is more colorful and more esthetically pleasing, it is not hard to understand why some men-particu-larly those of an artistic nature-would wish to wearwhat might appear feminine.

Today more and more young men are being seen in colorful and flashy wardro-bes. An extreme example of this trend is the group of young people known as "hippies." They are defining the prevalent customs of the day by wearing long hair, frilly clothing, beads and flowers. They say that they dress this way because they associate this style with gentleness-and because it pleases them, personally, and they are "doing their thing." One should not assume that young men who dress like this are all sexual deviates.

Studying the vast mass of scientific evidence and conjecture on the subject, we must come to the conclusion that there is no real, absolute, unchanging standard of sexual behavior, We simply do not have hard and fast definitions of ( continue on page 4)

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imprecise terms like "masculine,""feminine,""manly," or "womanly." Styles and modes of dress and outward appearances that may at one time have been considered very masculine-like powdered wigs once were, for instance-would now be considered susified if a man were to wear them.

Styles that are generally accepted as masculine or feminine also vary from country to country. In America heavy physical labor is considered "mans work" - while in Europe, women are employed in such positions. In the Soviet Union, most

of the physicians, technicians, physicists and streetcar conductors are women, while in the U.S.A. it is the men who hold down these jobs. At one time or another, you are sure to come face to face with a transvestite But the odds are you won't know it, for the transvestite is so much like the rest of us when he's abroad in the world that he and sometimes she, passes un-recognized, unsusceted, and indeed, not emen dreamed of. But because transvestism rarely strays out of its own backyard, as does home sexuality , it has been all butignored in the study of mens sexual aberations. thus not many otherwise well-informed persons know bts true nature. To the vast majority, the term transvestism, is so obscure, it might as well have something to do with space travel, or devil-worship. As defined by both medical and gen-eral dictionarys, it is a sexual anomaly or deviation in wich the affected per-son is addicted to wearing the clothes of the opposite sex. There are then, fe-male transvestitism in the United States and Europe has increased to such an extent in becent times that it is described as "enormous." Transvestites have, for the most part, been found to be above average intell-ectually and culturally, with perhaps more than a modest share of talents and aptitudes. For instance one gifted transvestite, beginning as a young "girl" rose to eminence in the women's fashion industry and, so sucessfully has he played the part, that recently he acted as maid-of-honor at a friends wedding. Transvestites differ in many ways, as do most human beings, this they have been classified into still further distant types, by the handful of pioneering scientists who are belatedly exploring this never-never land where the man in-sists on wearing, not the pants, but the panties. Some factors which may con-tribute are an extravagantly possessive mother, or the cross-dresser of a small boy to please a parent who wanted a girl. Other scientists believe that Tran-svestism is a basically organic condition. They regard

Michigan's only sex-reasignment surgical center has closed its doors. The Detroit free Press reported this story on March 4 1981. Dr. Mario Petini, for-mer head of the private clinic, announced that the closing is due to his moving to Minneapolis... Petrini will be continuing his suggical work with transsexual in Minneapolis... Agender-identity clinic at Case Weatern University is believe to be the closest one to the Detroit area. Some 15 others centers across the country are reported to still be in business and operating ... In a related stat ement, Petrini disputed the findings the ultimately ended sex reassignment surgery at Johns-Hopkins. Those findings were that surgery did not substanially improve lifestyles between groups of post-operative and pre-operative transsex-uals. Petrini disagrees and adds that he has never had a patient who regretted having had the surgery. (ED.NOTE: I can name 3 who have.)...Petrini credits the overall patient satisfaction to the cautious approach taken by his clinic which requires a 2 year life-trial in the role of the opposite sex. Personal testimon ial from a past-operative Crossroads member (operated on by Petrini) tends to incate something more than just caution as a factor in the overall successful program. She reports that Petrini's operative technique is among the best in the nation and that Petrini's patients generally have a capability for orgasm

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Dear Friends,

I regret the fact that I have to write this letter to all of you. This marks the end of the Crossroads Chapter as we now know it. There are two reasons for this. The first is the current membership listing. There are just too few of us to accomplish any of the plans that I have had (even if I did receive some support from a few of you, there hasn't been enough widespread support to make any of these ideas workable.) There is strength in numbers and we have very little present strength.

The second reason is that I have reached the limit of my physical and emotional strength to lead this organization as it should be led. I

don't have the energy or the time to run the group properly and don't foresee overcoming this at any time in the near future.

I'm stil a TV and will always remain one; I'm still interested in a social/self-help TV organization in southeast Michigan. I am willing to assist in any such group--as a member, but not as a leader anymore. There are several options available to you:

- 1. To continue Crossraods pretty much as it is, only under different leadership.
- 2. To merge with one of the national organizations, with Crossroads as one of its local chapters. The Gateway Alliance (which is itself is a merger of the Golden Gate Girls/Guys and the International Alliance of Male Feminists) has made a generous offer along these lines.
  - 3. To fold it up entirely. Most of us have found some friends with whom we can share some good times without an organized group.

Please let me know which of these options you prefer and I will do my best to see that the majority's wishes are carried out. Word of warning-- anyone who wants the group to continue as it is, had better volunteer to do some of the work.

Perhaps I should clarify the conditions for my own involvement. I am willing to help and work; but will only work one separate job. As I see it, there are five positions that require a great deal of work -the overall director (with the responsibility of answering inquiries from new people and of overall coordination); the newsletter editor, the secretary (...and there is a volunteer for this); the meeting/social director to plan, arrange and lead the meetings, and the treasurer. Shirley from Highland, MI, volunteered for this. I would be willing to accept <u>one</u> of these jobs.

The Gateway Alliance has offered to absorb us into their organization. Their dues are \$20.000 per year. They publish <u>the Phoenix</u>, which is a monthly news magazine and a membership directory, which are part of the membership package. A national directory of shops, places to go, organizations, and services for the TV or TS is also published by the alliance. If the overall decision is to drop the group completely, I will refund (as much as possible) the treasury to all the active, paid members. (This is minus the cost of two newsletter editions, checks and checking account charges.) Crossroads purchased an electric typewriter last November in order to be able to produce a newsletter at all. I will buy this at a fair price and it will be included in the refund amount.

Another merger possibility exists with Elaine Willey's Tri-Sigma chapter in Ann Arbor. Elaine and I will be discussing this possibility in the very near future. If any of you are unfamiliar with Tri-Sigma, it is a nationwide Tv organization whose interest is slanted in the direction of the hetrosexual crossdresser. Several chapters are currently in operation.

Please write and let me know which of these options that you prefer--I have no way of knowing what the majority of the group wants unless you say so. I can't really accept any kind of verbal answer since there is a good possibility that I may forget your answer unless I have it on paper where I can see it. Also, I may not be able to send you any kind of individual reply to this-- I have over 100 letters in front of me right now that already need individual attention.

Meeting so many of you has been one of the great pleasures of my life. I will never be able to forget any of you. For the sake of my family and my own menta and physical well-being, ISve been forced to cut back involvement. This has been a difficult and painful decision to make. BEST WISHES TO ALL. # -- page Benefits of Transsexual Surgery

### By JANE E. BRODY

T a time when sex-change operations are on the in-crease at major medical centers around the country, Johns Hopkins — the prestigious hospital that started it all — has stopped doing them, using as its justification a study that has been widely attacked by others in the field. The study called into question the bene-fits of these drastic operations.

The controversy has brought to the surface a growing concern about how to identify transsexuals and select those who are suitable for sex-change surgery. It has also reopened the possibility that pyschotherapy might play a role in helping many of the thousands of self-proclaimed trans-sexuals make a better life adjustment without surgery.

Transsexuals believe they are really members of the opposite sex trapped in the wrong bodies. Their gender

identity, as specialists call it, does not match their physical

identity, as provided to the failure of psychotherapy to change the minds of transsexuals to match their bodies, Johns Hopkins' physicians in 1966 began instead to try to match the bodies to the patients' minds. Doctors at several other American medical centers soon took up the complex operation that medical centers soon took up the complex operation that previously had been the province primarily of doctors in Ti-juana, Casablanca and Barcelona and a few private physi-

Juana, Casabianca and Barcelona and a few private physi-cians in this country. Since then, an estimated 4,000 persons have had sex-change operations in this country, about a third of them performed by university-based physicians. At the outset, the overwhelming majority involved operations that changed men into "women," but today an equal number of patients are women who become "men." The usual costs of surgery are between \$5,000 and \$10,000. The surgery attracts so much public attention because

The surgery attracts so much public attention because

of its extreme and irreversible nature. In changing a male to female, the penis and testicles are removed and an artificial vagina is constructed. Female sex hormones are given and sometimes the breasts are enlarged surgically. In the sometimes the breasts are emarged surgicany. In changing a female to a male, the breasts, ovaries and uterus are removed, testicles are constructed and some-times a penis is made from skin flaps. Although incapable of erection, the new penis can be made functional with implants or devices now used to treat impotent men. Male sex hormones are given.

In addition to those already operated on, tens of thousands have applied for the surgery, some undoubtedly prompted by the publicity received by such persons as Dr. Renee Richards, the transsexual tennis player who achieved world ranking at the age of 42 after becoming a woman. However, according to researchers, the vast ma-

jority of sex-changed persons meld qui-etly into their new lives and try to keep their former identities a secret. Many marry and raise adopted children. Most hold full-time jobs. After the ini-tial euphoria wears off, some patients have reported disappointment that there were no dramatic changes in their lives. their lives.

plan to stop on the basis of the new re-port. However, he and others expressed fears that findings from so esteemed an institution as Johns Hopkins would cause some medical centers to curtailly their operations and discourage others from starting to do them. The result, they predicted, will be that more and more patients will go to private doctors here and abroad for precipitous and often inappropriate surgery. In Dr. Meyer's, study, published in the August issue of the Archives of Gen-eral Psychiatry, half of 100 patients who had applied to the Baltimore uni-versity's Gender Identity Clinic for "sex reassignment" were located and interviewed in person. Fifteen had re-ceived the sex-change operation at the university, 25 had not had the opera-tion, and 14 had gone elsewhere for the surgery. All the patients were evalu-ated for "objective" measurements of The new study, done by Dr. Jon K. Meyer, a Johns Hopkins psychiatrist who was closely involved with evaluatwho was closely involved with evaluat-ing candidates for surgery, purports to show that persons who were operated on at the university were no better ad-justed afterward than those denied the surgery. The worst outcome was found among patients who were denied trans-corrued surgery at Johns Honking but among patients who were denied trans-sexual surgery at Johns Hopkins but then got it elsewhere, usually from a private physician or clinic where, ac-cording to the university practitioners, careful preoperative evaluations are rarely done.

"Considering the enormity of the sur-gery, it's not justified if it's only a cos-metic procedure," Dr. Meyer conclud-ed. "My personal feeling is that sur-gery is not a proper treatment for a

psychiatric disorder, and it's clear to psychiatric disorder, and it's clear to me that these patients have severe psy-chological problems that don't go away following surgery." He cited one case in which a woman required hospitaliza-tion for drug dependency and suicidal intentions after being changed to a male male.

male. Others claim Dr. Meyer's study is seriously flawed in its methods and statistics and draws unwarranted con-clusions. The study, which has raised the ire of gender-identity specialists across the county, is slated for review by a "blue ribbon committee" at the American Psychiatric Association's national meeting in May

American Psychiatric Association's national meeting in May. According to Dr. Paul A. Walker of the University of Texas, Galveston, Gender Identity Clinic, who heads an information and referral service for

Researchers have found that many Researchers have found that many patients who apply for sex-change operations are not transsexuals but rather transvestites (those who are sexually stimulated by dressing as the opposite sex) or "guilty" homosexuals

who believe it is morally and legally more acceptable to be a transsexual. Such patients should be treated with psychotherapy, not a scalpel, Dr. Walker said.

In the same issue of the journal with Dr. Meyer's report, in contradiction to previous failures of psychotherapy, Dr. David H. Barlow of Brown University in Providence, R.I., described the in Providence, R.I., described the "successful change in gender identity" of three persons through behavior modification. He said he had trained them through conditioning techniques to act and think more like others of their biological sex. 'n an earlier re-port, Dr. Barlow described a transsex-ual "well on his way to surgery" who was changed by a faith healer through exorcism, suggesting that methods short of surgery might help such peo-ple. ple.

Walker countered that "if you Dr can change them, they weren't trans-sexuals in the first place. I cure people every week, sometimes just by telling them what the preoperative workup and surgery will involve."

### 'Real-Life' Test Required

est adjustment. "If the study shows anything at all," Dr. Walker remarked, "it's that care-ful screening before surgery is critical to the outcome. You have to be very careful about whom you operate on. Many applicants, certain that they want an operation, give a very convinc-ing biography of a transsexual. They know exactly what to say. But if you put up any barriers to the surgery, they change their minds."

**Screening Termed Critical** 

Most applicants for surgery, includ-ing some of those most determined at the outset, change their minds in the course of a preoperative evaluation. Only 10 to 15 percent are good candi-dates for surgery, according to Dr. Norman Fisk, psychiatrist at Stanford University in Palo Alto, Calif. Stanford Degan doing transcervised surgery two began doing transsexual surgery two years after Johns Hopkins and now has the largest university-based program.

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patients to pass a "real-life" test — to live as their chosen sex 24 hours a day for at least a year before the operation. Stanford insists on a minimum of two years, as did'Johns Hopkins toward the end of its program. "Patients have to be successful psy-chologically, socially and economically in their new sex before we operate," Dr. Fisk said. "Surgery is just the cap-stone. We don't expect it to cause any dramatic transformation in their lives." Dr. Walker pointed out that Dr. Meyer's study examined patients just before their surgery but after they had, completed the real-life test. He added that "most of the changes had already taken place, so it's no surprise that he taken place, so it's no surprise that he found no further improvement after-ward."

Several years ago, Dr. Fisk did his own follow-up study, interviewing all of the 170 patients who had been operated upon at Stanford by that time. He found that give to gight years after surgery that six to eight years after surgery they were better off than the general population in terms of emotional or population in terms of emotional or psychosocial problems, were better ad-justed in their communities and had markedly improved sex lives, with all able to reach orgasm. Those who changed from female to male all earned more after surgery, but most of the male-to-female patients had to set-tle for a lower income after their change. change.

change. None expressed any regrets about the surgery, not even the three patients who had gone back to living in their original sex roles. Two of these three were men who, after surgery, found that they could not do well economi-cally as women; the third reverted to living as a male after having an intense religious experience, Dr. Fisk said.

# AVOIDING CONFUSION

HOUSTON—The city council has rescinded a Houston ordinance aimed at transvestites that prohibited "appearing

in public dressed with the intent to disguise his or her sex as that of the oppo-site sex." The action came after a Federal judge decided the law violated the civil rights of transsexuals, and the Houston police legal department acknowledged that an arresting officer would have no way of knowing if a suspect were a legal transsexual, an illegal transvestite or what the difference was. The decision noted that dressing in clothing of the opposite sex is fre-quently part of the treatment preceding a legitimate sex-change operation.

Meanwhile, the Fifth U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans has ordered a lower court to reconsider whether or not a state Medicaid program may be required to pay for prescribed transsexual surgery.
